Remembrance service stirs hearts on Sunday

"I speak as the voice of the missing man", said Rev. Tom Appleton who did not wish to be recognized as representing any special church but rather, as one presenting the ambitions, the dreams, and the tremendous hopes of the millions of young men who, during the last war gave their lives for their country. His plea was that their lives had not been given in vain but their dreams fulfilled and the world become a peaceful place in which to live.

Sunday's Remembrance Day service held at the Rockwood Centennial School auditorium was a moving memorial to the men who had given their lives in past wars, for the parents of veterans who had never

returned, and to those whose only knowledge of war was history books and wartime movies.

Hearts stirred
It was a marvellous dedication. The youthful voices of the Eramosa Choral Society stirred the hearts of the congregation as they sang six numbers conducted by Mrs. R. Hoey. The combined ministerial body of Rockwood Village and Eramosa participated in the 1 a.m. ceremony as Rev. Don Sinclair represented the Presbyterian church, Rev. Ralph Williams the United Church and Rodney Bell of Eden Mills read in place of Father F. C. Elliot for the Sacred Heart congregation.

The assemblage was united as it prayed and sang together in

hymns of dedication and praise. Previous to the Centennial School combined congregational service, a parade of scouts, cubs, guides and brownies had marched to the Cenotaph led by members of the Legion and Legion Auxillary. At the ceremony, wreaths had been laid with Comrade Margaret Lambert laying one for the Province of Ontario; Jimmy Higgins placed a wreath representing the Acton Legion Branch 197; Reeve Warren Parkinson one for the township of

Eramosa and a family wreath, in memory of John D. Hills, was placed by his brother Lou.

Max Storey was the day's parade marshal; leading the color party was Ted LeBlanc of Acton; reading the Legion charge was president Bob Angell of the Acton Legion and Rev. Tom Appleton, rector of St. John's Church, Rockwood and St. James the Apostle in Guelph delivered the special memorial sermon at the Centennial School when the parade party returned after the official cenotaph dedication.

Classify road as farm lane

Eramosa Council was reluctant to classify an unopened road allowance on the Given Road as more than a farm lane when it comes to keeping it open through the winter.

Roy Hebert approached council with a request to keep the road open through the winter since he was going to build a home about

1,000 feet from the First and Second Line, south of 7 Highway. He told council he had put a four inch bed of gravel on the road allowance and since he paid taxes he felt he was entitled to receive something for them.

Reeve Warren Parkinson said the Given Road at the point amounts to nothing more than Mr. Hebert's lane and "we have all kinds of similar situations in the township".

Council suggested Mr. Hebert should approach the '73 council with a formal application to open the road.

Dog on docket

"We can't get rid of him. You'll have to let your conscience be your guide," Reeve Warren Parkinson advised dog owner Larry McDougall when he appeared before Eramosa Council with dog control officer George Martin.

Mr. McDougall's dog was accused of worrying sheep at the corner of the Sixth Line and 24 Highway on the Murray Stewart farm. He had restrained the dog since the accusation was made there were still reports of sheep being killed in the area.

In a discussion over the habits of sheep the deputy-reeve told council that different breeds exhibited different characteristics. Suffolks are wanderers, Dunc McPhedran advised, while Southdowns are stay-at-homes, making them easier to keep track of. Suffolks are more readily attacked when they wander.

Council agreed the onus was on Larry McDougall to determine whether his dog was guilty of worrying the animals and it would be up to him to take appropriate action, in this case. Councillors said in many cases a dog would not bother sheep on his own farm but would not hesitate to attack a neighbour's animals.

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
