### 401 boundary line in Halton region?

Regionalization of the areas east and west of Toronto can be expected in the early months of 1973, this newspaper was told Friday in an interview with Claude Bennett, a minister in the Davis Government responsible for regional planning.

Bennett warned that if the municipalities concerned did not work out an equitable form of region the Province might be forced to step in as an arbitrator.

Asked about Halton's plans to create a three region county and Milton's counter-proposal for a four borough Halton, Bennett made no direct reply. However, he said Highway 401 could be considered a natural boundary.

If Highway 401 is used as a boundary it would create considerable confusion since both Halton plans for regionalization extended above or below the highway. The road runs directly through the southern chunks of Esquesing and Nassagaweya which Milton would like to add central Halton borough.

Would this mean that Milton would be tied in with Burlington and Oekville?

Bennett made no further comment.

Highway 401 could be considered a natural boundary but the Province has disregarded it before, most recently when the neighboring communities of Kitchener, Waterloo, Preston, Galt and Hespeler were all included in one region. Galt and Preston are on the southern side of the road while Kitchener and Hespeler are on the northern side.

Milton wrote a separate brief in opposition to a county brief to Queen's Park advocating a four unit Halton region. The Milton brief contends Milton can create a separate borough in central Halton with full services on an estimated \$33 million assessment base by including nearby assessment from Nassagaweya and Esquesing and parts of

Burlington and Oakville, The four northern municipalities oppose the Milton brief declaring that if the northern end of the county is to have a cohesive unit it must include assessment Milton desires for a central borough.

# O.P.P. report active week

## Province will draw boundaries if municipalities can't agree

By 1975 Ontario will have a map to show the boundaries of regional and consolidated forms of government, Claude Bennett, Ottawa South M.P.P. told an Ontario Weekly Newspapers Association seminar Friday morning.

Bennett, actively involved in planning and reorganization of the province, said Government was not married to county boundaries and would not hesitate to preside at regional shotgun weddings if the communities involved could not decide for themselves.

An exponent of the one tier regional government system, Bennett was former Parliamentary Assistant to Darcy McKeough, Minister of the Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs. He was recently named Minister Without

He warned about confusing the five economic regions of the province with establishment of regional authorities. "There is no direct relation between them,"

open to discussion, he declared, province could completely disregard county boundaries if they conflict with the economic base or the sphere of influence. County boundaries were established over a century ago so no one would be further than a day's travel from the capital.

Bennett also said boundaries could change in the years to come as conditions and the economic base changes. Afterwards, he told one member of the press that the town of Smiths Falls in Eastern Ontario could disappear if it was not economically to exist. He did say, however, that regional grants would be available from the province in the early years of regional government to even out the tax

Bennett said that once the changeover to a regional set-up was made, and the Official Plan approved by the Minister, planning would be the responsibility of the region, not the minister.

Complaints by municipalities over the tardiness of Queen's Park to respond to Official Plans with suggestions was only one side of the coin, Bennett said. "It is the same situation at the other end when it takes five or six months to get the municipalities to respond to the province's suggestions."

The province is short of competent and experienced planners to process applications, Bennett said, but the municipalities must do their share to speed up the work.

Bennett has a background in municipal politics, serving as an alderman and a member of the Board of Control in Ottawa. where he was also acting mayor for 18 months. He won the Ottawa Boundaries are completely South seat in October 1971, in a traditional Tory stronghold. indicating strongly that the Recently Premier Davis appointed him as the second minister responsible to the Trilevel Conference with the Federal Government.
