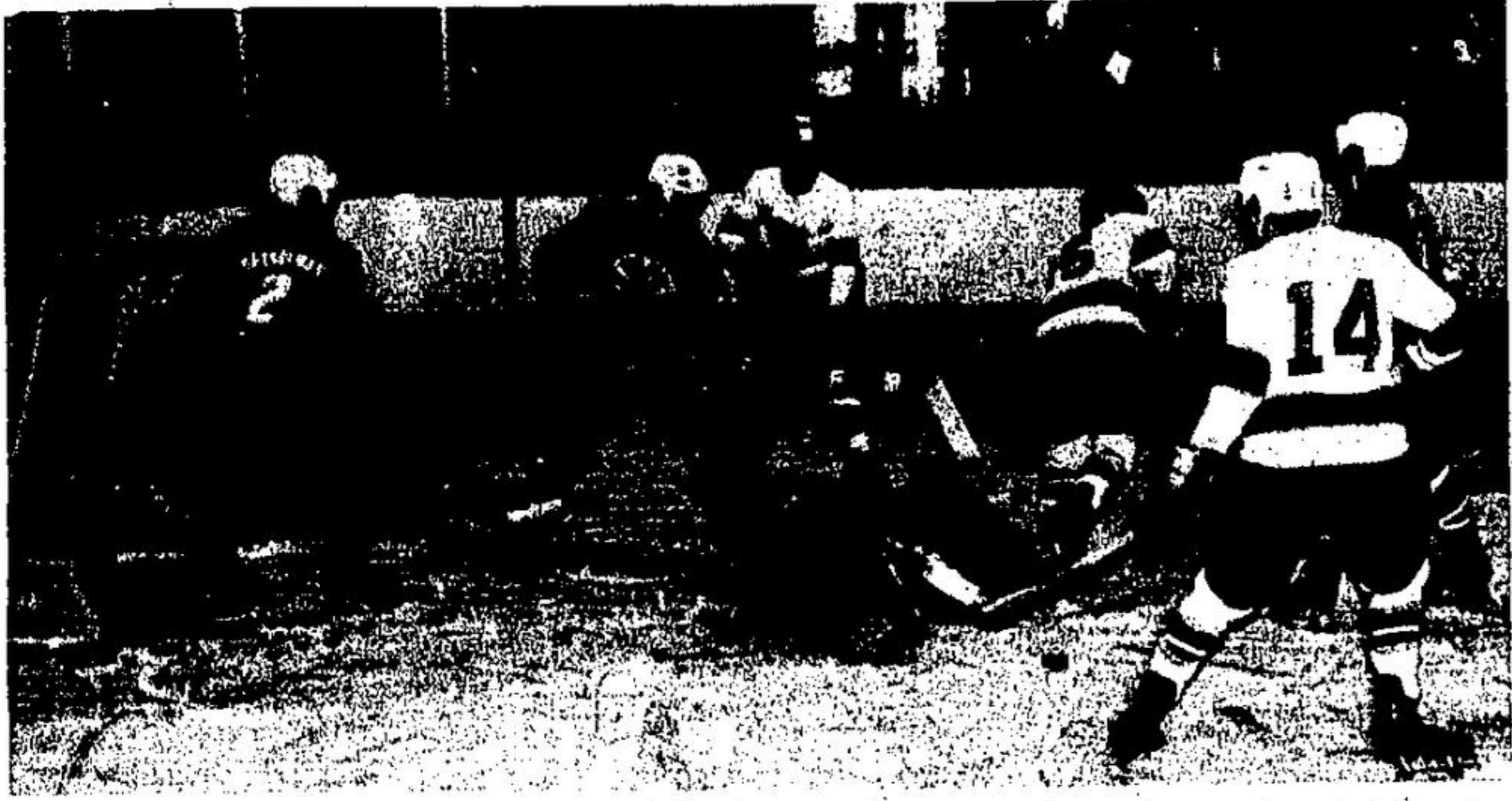


Rookies rate accolades as Sabres tie Stayner
