Death of Frank Kelso grieves people of Rockwood

Rockwood villagers were deeply grieved to learn of the passing of Frank Kelso at Guelph General Hospital Friday, November 17, one day after his 60th birthday.



Born in Guelph, November 18, 1912, he was the son of the late Joseph and Suzie Kelso. He was married October 1, 1938 to Georgina Laverty of Rockwood. The couple has lived in Rockwood for the past 25 years.

A staunch community man, Frank Kelso left a mark in many areas of village activities. Over the years he has participated in numerous endeavors and has contributed in many phases of community life.

He served as a Village Trustee and knew and understood Rockwood's civic needs and never lost interest in local current affairs. He was always open to new considerations but prepared to present the long range view.

In his younger years he was an ardent athlete, outstanding on Rockwood and Guelph baseball and hockey teams. He was interested in every aspect of sportsmanship. As a strong conservationist he was one of the

founders of the Rockwood Fish and Game Association and a member of the local Triangle Fishing Club.

He was one of the original members of the Rockwood-Eramosa Fire Department, serving latterly in the capacity of secretary-treasurer. He was also a member of the newly formed Rockwood and District Lions Club.

On November 20 at Rockwood Cemetery, Frank Kelso was laid to rest by active and honorary members of the Rockwood-Eramosa Fire Brigade. Pallbearers were long-time friends Herb Saunders, Ed Langdon, Earl Doby, Frank Schneider, Albert Malby, all of Rockwood, and Bert Pinkney of Guelph. Other brigade members formed an Honor Guard and acted as flower bearers.

It must be realized that a period of discussion and education have to take place since no scheme as this will be successful unless it achieves co-operation from a large segment of the people involved.

Quite a bit of work has already been done, both by the town staff and some members of council. The Development Commission, as well as the Chamber of Commerce, has been working on the problems. We know for instance that a five mill increase in business taxes in the C.B.D. would produce \$1,000,000 a year and the highest individual increase amount to \$147 and lowest to 50 cents per

year. Commercial assessment in the area's \$1/2 million business tax is levied on \$200,000.

The Chamber of Commerce has already taken a large step forward in this that they have decided to decorate the core area at a cost of \$3,500. Perhaps this will be the beginning of a period of improvements. I hope the council, the Chamber or the Development Commission will pick up the challenge and convene a meeting where we might agree on a course of action.

A Roman elevator is not enclosed. It looks like a floating jail cell with a plywood floor. The floor seems pretty flimsy when you are suspended four or five floors up.

Our party of five was jammed. A sign in Italian suggested a maximum load of three. I started to get nervous.

Then as if it had satisfied its whims the cage shuddered and started to ascend again. We finally alighted on the top storey to a chorus of relief from the four scared passengers.

Although we stayed at that pension for two more days my trips on that elevator were confined to only the occasions when I was in a hurry to ascend or descend. The stairs, huge marble steps which belonged in a Roman palace, had so many steps they winded a fellow trying to keep up with it with

all its quirks and shudders.

But it wasn't the only time I was nervous in Europe. Try riding a taxi in Vienna if you want a real thrill.

The cabs in the gracious Austrian capital are almost all Mercedes-Benz. The drivers push the pedals to the floor as they race through the narrow streets in the old city and really let 'em out in the newer sections when streets are wider.

Wear a trench coat and pull down hat brim and you feel like you're part of that old thriller Foreign Intrigue, as you thunder through Vienna's picturesque alleys. You could almost imagine you had a tryst with another spy from behind the Iron Curtain which guards Hungary's borders only a few miles from the streets of Vienna.

If you have a bad heart or don't like stomach-butterflies, I advise you skirt elevators in Rome and taxis in Vienna.
