Buoyant spending

Zeller's Limited reports a sales increase of 23.8 percent and net income up by 33.7 percent for the nine months ending October, 1972.

Sales totalled \$164,894,796 to the end of the Company's third fiscal quarter, representing an increase in volume of \$31,715,642 over the comparable period last year. Net income for the nine months to October, 1972 was \$4,583,995 which was equal after the payment of preferred share dividends, to 35 cents per common share against 26 cents a share earned in the corresponding nine months of 1971.

A company spokesman said "buoyant customer spending is reflected in our experiencing better than average sales gains in home furnishings and major appliances departments as well as the fact that customer sales on credit are growing at a better rate than over-all company sales. All indications point to a record year for Zeller's Limited in terms of both sales and income."
