Last night (Tuesday), less than 24 hours after he was re-elected, Hill vowed there is no way the Halton Region Conservation Authority will get more money out of Esquering than its normal requisition.

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THE TOWN OF ACTON BY-LAW NUMBER 71-1508

The following is an excerpt from the Corporation of the Town of Acton's By-Law Number 71-1508, passed on January 26th, 1971 by the Council of the Town of Acton:

"Whereas Section 476, Paragraph Numbers 1 and 4 of the Municipal Act, being R.S.O. 1960, Chapter 249 and amendments thereto, authorizes the Council of a municipality to pass a By-law prohibiting the obstruction, encumbering, injuring or fouling of highways or bridges, and prohibiting the throwing, placing or depositing of dirt, glass, etcetera on highways or bridges.

Without in any way limiting the generality of the preceding paragraph 1, no person shall throw, place or deposit on any public lane or highway in the Town of Acton, any snow, ice, slush, dirt, filth, glass, paper, rubbish or refuse.

Every person who contravenes any portion of this By-law shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the convicting judge a penalty not exceeding (exclusive of costs) the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for each offence."
