# Broken gas main Hillsburgh headache

Fire Chief Bob Cheyne it was three days before a crew appeared before Erin Township Council to report on a gas line that blew out on Main St., Hillsburgh, caused department concern November.

' Gas was noticed blowing into the air by skaters returning home and reported to the fire department. Since it was Sunday, the gas company wasn't available, so the fire department set up a crew plus an OPP officer to direct traffic.

When a representative did arrive from the gas company, Mr. Cheyne told council, he only had an instrument to check for danger levels in the air. A weekend crew did a temporary repair job where two pipes had come apart at the join.

Although gas was still leaking,

returned to finish the repair.

Second time Mr. Cheyne pointed out it was the second time the main line had come apart in town, (the first was in testing) also that there was poor repair procedure, with

wrong or no equipment. "With it leaking like that" he concluded "it didn't fire, but it could have, from cigarettes, or spark from an ignition, or any number of things."

Councillor Bert Wheeler added That could be a dnagerous situation. We should let the company know we're not satisfied with services and maybe hold off on acting on ruture development until there's some sort of investigation." A letter will be sent to Consumers Gas Company to that effect.

## Average Halton family contains 3.7 persons

The average family in Halton County contains 3.7 persons including 1.8 children, according to the 1971 Canadian cencus. Cencus officials found 47,500 families in the county in June of

1971, totalling 176,830 persons, or 3.7 per family. The totals included 83,025 children, an average of 1.8 per family. They located a total of 51,785 households with 188,505 persons, or an average of 3.6 per

The cencus gives a breakdown for Georgetown, Oakville and Burlington, but not for the other four communities in Halton. The average number of persons in a family was slightly higher in Georgetown (3.8) than in Oakville or Burlington (3.7). Oakville and Georgetown averaged 1.8 children per family, while

Burlington had 1.7 children per


