### Council backs its amendment

Eramosa township council refused to grant a permit to land owner Jack Sargent for a Shamrock Motors car lot on Guelph St., Rockwood, although at the previous meeting councillors declared there was likely nothing they could do to

stop it. Council passed an amendment to the zoning by-law to prohibit the display, sale or offer for sale of any new or used automobile or other motor driven vehicles or machinery in the village earlier in the year. Shamrock Motors proprietor Jack Sheehy challenged the amendment, charging it discriminated against has besiness.

Council decided, however, to stack by their amendment.


