

Let's Play Bridge





it seems that no North would resist bidding. Everyone reentered the bidding. Now I admit that I hate to pass with sixteen high card points. In this case, however, it is the only reasonable thing to do. North is sitting under East. That is, East's high cards. If you interchange the North and South hands, then this hand is worth a double.

In fact one North did double and South took the bid out to two hearts. This was down one, which is better than down two at two no trump. The best North-South


