

> Cenotaph She was the last surviving member of the committee which arranged the erection of the War Memorial after World War I.

> After her marriage she became a member of Knox church and also its W.M.S. and Ladies' Ald. During the course of her 66-year membership she was honored with an honorary life membership in the Women's Missionary society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and she was an officer of the Guelph Presbytery executive W.M.S. for many years. She served as treasurer of the W.M.S. for 25 years.

Insurance business

Her husband, who died in 1941, was an employee of Beardmore and Co., later customs officer and insurance agent. He was also onetime fire chief of the brigade secretary of Acton school board and secretary of Walker Lodge. After his death, Mrs. MacDonald ably carried on his insurance business for 12 years. At this time she personally knew almost everyone in town,
