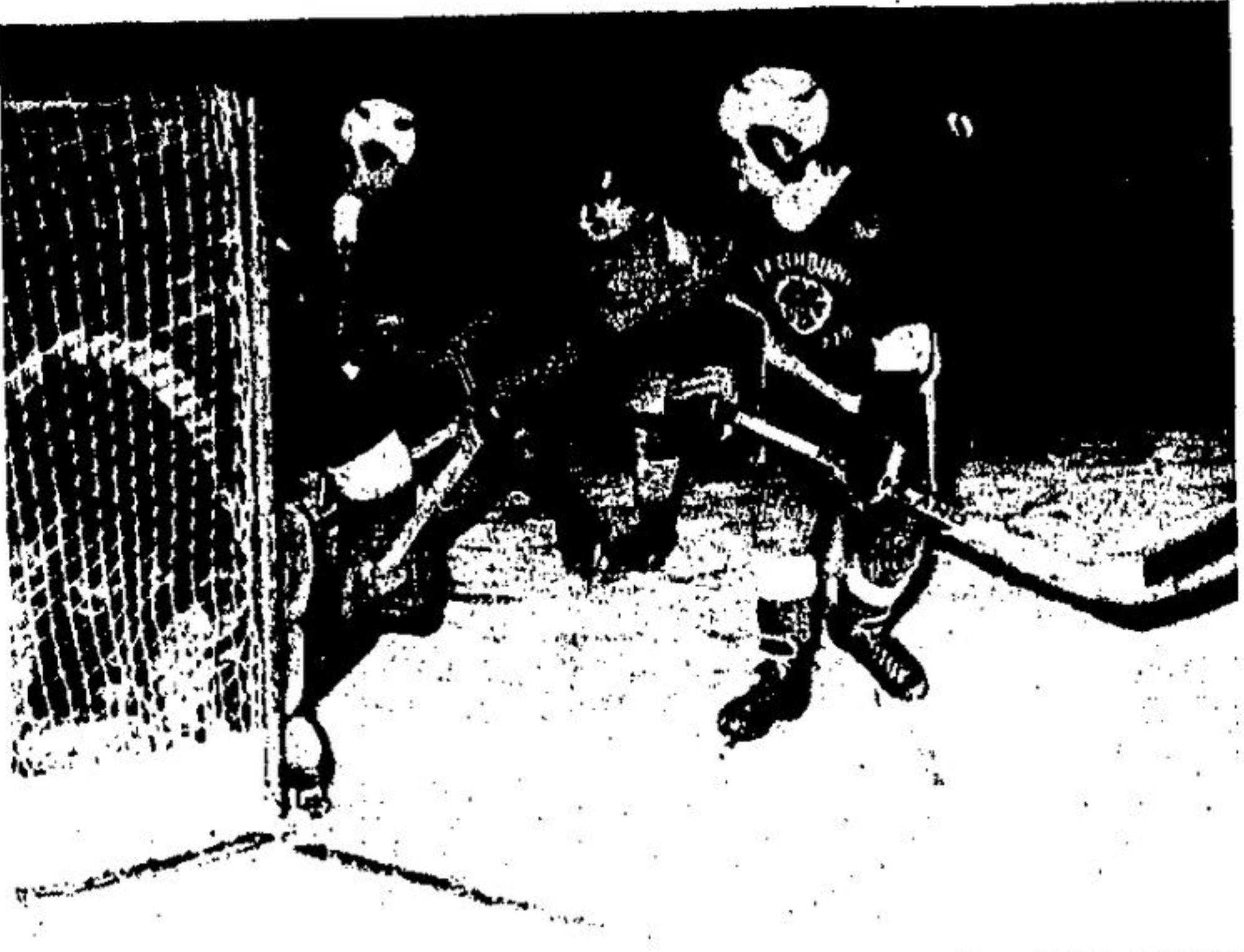
From North Halton
