11/2 tsp. cinnamon 1 cup sour cream I cup chopped walnuts or raisins 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten. Cream margarine and sugar well. Add egg yolks and beat

light. Continue beating while adding honey. Sift dry ingredients. Add to creamed mixture alternately with sour cream. Stir in nuts or raisins, fold in stiffly beaten egg

Spoon into a greased 12 cup tube pan (angel food cake pan). Bake for 40 minutes at 325 degrees. Lower heat to 300 degrees and bake another 20 minutes or until done. Dust with icing sugar. .
