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# Announce new proposal

president of Krever Fibres Ltd., a major recycling company the 3000 lb. six by three foot compacted bales containing the remaining shredded waste would be innocuous and almost entirely free of moisture. He said the shredding operation itself eliminates all effective odor. A film made at a similar plant which has been in operation in San Diego California indicated that the bales are compacted to almost rock solid state.

Anglo hopes to have the plant in operation by the end of 1973.

Indusmin president J. J. Mather announced at the same

press conference that his company's plans call for the bales to be removed daily from the proposed processing plant in Toronto to the Acton quarries in trucks, which are already used to carry aggregates into the Metro area. This way, he explained, no additional truck traffic would be produced. All trucks would travel on Highways 25 and 401.

**Covered immediately**  
Mather said the bales would be covered with limestone screening the same day they arrive, ruling out the possibility of rain or snow affecting their moisture content.

He estimated that trucks would be returning about 40 loads of bales each day to the quarry site.

Each load in transit would be covered with tarpaulins and would be both physically and visually satisfactory, he said.

Backfilling operations would not be highly visible to anyone because of the considerable depth of the excavation and the mounds of covered and landscaped fill already in place along adjacent roads, Mather said. He added that the availability of sanitary bales as additional backfill material would enable the company to improve its present plans for site rehabilitation.

When the quarry is completely filled in, it would be covered with a four foot layer of topsoil and landscaped with trees and grass. The quarry is already excavated to a depth of 60 feet. The area of present excavation is approximately 115 acres. Mather said the quarry could accept as much as 1,000,000 tons of shredded refuse a year.

Indusmin is already making plans to hold a public meeting about the project in Esquesing township later this month. Company representatives will also outline the project at an Acton Chamber of Commerce meeting February 21. The project is still subject to the approval of township council and other provincial bodies.

**Commendation**  
The Anglo recycling proposal has been commended by Environment Minister James

Auld and the University of Toronto branch of Pollution Probe. In a letter to the company, Auld also said the proposed landfill site at the quarry has been examined and meets the requirements of the Ministry.

Esqueusing Reeve Tom Hill, Councillor Wilfrid Leslie and clerk-treasurer Delmar French attended the press conference, but all refused comment on the proposal.

Contacted by the Free Press, Acton Mayor Les Duby said he is looking at the proposal with an open mind, but added he has been assured by the Department of the Environment's regional engineer that further studies will have to be made and public hearings held before the project receives final approval.



## ACTON Municipal Council ACTIVITIES

—Council learned the subdivision agreement between McNamara Corporation and the town for Acton Meadows phase 2 was ready for signing. The agreement includes a list of things that are to be done such as engineering approval, guarantee bond, insurance, hydro agreement, conveyances and easements.

—A building by-law was passed which adopts the National Building Code for the town.

—Administration committee received a letter from the retail section of the Chamber of Commerce that a number of merchants had contributed \$200 toward the Christmas bus service, and since they hadn't completed their survey they hoped more would be forthcoming.


—Council learned the Station Hotel's building plans have been approved by the Liquor License board and were to be inspected by the town building inspector.

—Attending a meeting of the public works and utilities commission were C. Wilcox, superintendent, and D. Hastings, solicitor, representing R. Noble, to discuss problems relating to services on Maria St. as well as the new apartment building. After a lengthy discussion


several matters were agreed upon. The town engineer will prepare plans for storm sewers and watermain services and supervise their installation. Mr. Noble agreed to construct a sidewalk abutting on the apartment building of Church St. Services are to be corrected. Water and hydro are not to be turned on until the Committee of Adjustment meeting Feb. 12.

—A letter was received from Halton county board of education advising consideration is being given to construction of a new parking lot at the M. Z. Bennett school.

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
