Legion letter puzzles parks board

Acton community centre will probably be in immaculate shape for the Legion pee-wee house league hockey tournament, February 24 and 25, but some members of Acton Parks and Recreation Committee are puzzled about what the Legion Minor Hockey Association meant in a letter read at Monday night's monthly meeting.

The letter asked that an arena employee clean out dressing rooms after each game on tournament days, seals be kept clear of refuse and perhaps windows looking out onto the ice surface be cleaned to allow spectators the best possible view.

The letter also pointed out that O.M.H.A. rules state that referees' room is referees only and out of bounds to all others.

"Well that's not the arena manager's fault," interrupted Councillor Barry Insoce in specific reference to the comment about the referees' room.

Hoped constructive
Councillor Orval Chapman said he hoped the Legion association's remarks were made as constructive criticism and not as criticism of the situation in the building at large.

Chairman Diane Spielvogel said she was told that dressing rooms were in deplorable condition at last year's tournament and that unauthorized people were wandering into the referees' rooms.

Arena manager Harold Townsley provided some background information for the discussion.

Gives background
"When this tournament was

initiated three years ago, I was told they would supply boys to sweep out these rooms," he said. "But if they want us to do it, we'll do it."

"How often are the windows cleaned?" asked committee member Ted Frait.

"At least twice a week," Townsley replied. The arena manager proceeded to explain that most of the window problems are caused by children who put both hands on them, while watching a game.

The letter also mentioned that the Legion "will be entertaining 15 visiting teams and would like these people to leave with the impression of having participated in a well organized tournament hosted in a well-managed arena. The operation of the arena may reflect the operation of the town in the minds of our visitors."

The committee agreed to honor the requests, but also decided to reply to the Legion tournament letter.

Parks board rules out conflict in parking

Acton Parks and Recreation Committee has ruled that community centre parking and washroom facilities will not be available to participants and spectators involved in the Acton Y's Men's Club snowmobile races, rescheduled for Sunday, February 25, following a postponement February 4.

The committee made the decision after receiving a letter of concern from the Acton Legion Minor Hockey Association, which will stage its fourth annual pee-wee house league tournament in the community centre the same weekend. The letter asked that the committee take action to avoid a conflict in use of facilities.

Under similar circumstances last year it is understood parking facilities were taxed to the extent

that some fans attending a junior hockey game in the community centre had their cars completely blocked. Snowmobile race spectators used the community centre facilities, walking in and out of the building freely, even though a game was in progress and admissions were being charged.

Explaining the committee's decision, chairman Diane Spielvogel said the Legion Minor Hockey Association had booked dates for its tournament as early as last September and would definitely have to get preference on use of facilities. She added that the committee received no notification from the Y's Men about the original date for their races February 4. Unsuitable weather conditions on that day forced the postponement.
