

Outlining some of his problems to the township council Friday afternoon, he said he could spend most of his time in the Everton area and still be fighting a losing battle. He estimates there are 40 dogs there.

Concerned with Rockwood ilso, where the assistant dog controller has resigned, Mr. Martin asked councillors to ensure a replacement was hired. "Things sure settled down when the village got a dog controller."

Council also reviewed the issuing of dog tags and decided to place them at Turner's store in Eden Mills, at the Rockwood village office as well as township offices to make it more convenient for residents to purchase
