Kempling proposes new federal riding

Nasasagawaya, East and West
Flamboro and Beverley
Townships, the village of
Waterdown and the town of
Dundas should constitute one
federal riding, Halton-Wentworth
MP Bill Kempling states in a two-
page brief to the federal electoral
boundaries commission.
Members of Nasasagawaya
Council received the brief at their
meeting Monday, but took no
action.

Kitchener-Waterloo, the Paris
area which is Brantford oriented,
and the Waterdown and East
Flamboro areas which are
oriented toward Dundas.
Burlington and Nasasagawaya
would be removed from the
present riding—Burlington to
remain as one riding and
Nasasagawaya to be lumped with
a vast rural riding stretching
north from Milton to near
Durham.

Galt and Burlington should be
ridings of their own but the
smaller towns, villages and
townships in that area should
form a separate unit, he
concludes. "With the increasing
complexity of government and
the input to legislative programs
by the electorate through their
members, good communication
is essential. Communications in
the Galt-Dundas riding will be
extremely difficult," he
concludes.

Halton gets more pupils in region

If school boundaries follow
municipal boundaries as set up in
the province's proposals for
regional government, Halton
County Board of Education will
gain an additional 2,000 pupils
from East Flamborough and
Waterdown. A small area in East
Oakville that will go to Peel
region will account for a loss of
about 60 students.
Halton County Board of
Education is pleased with the
regional proposals. At a recent
meeting chairman Bill Priestner
noted that he favored the Halton
board serving the entire region
but added that the province
hadn't specified that point yet.
Priestner suggested the
proposals indicated
transportation would be a
regional responsibility and saw
a possibility of the board saving
money on transportation through
subsidies.

Issue rabies warning

It's that time of year when
rabies is more prevalent among
wild animals and Halton County
Health Unit has issued a timely
warning to all residents of the
county. Notices have been
distributed through the schools to
alert children to the dangers.
The Health Unit suggests:
1. Do not touch or handle any
dead animal of any species.
2. Avoid contact with all wild
animals. Do not attempt to pet or
feed any fox, skunk, raccoon,
woodchuck, muskrat, rabbit,
squirrel, chipmunk.
3. If your own pet is ill or
behaving strangely, stay away
from it until your veterinarian
has made a diagnosis.
4. Family pets, particularly
cats and dogs, should be
immunized against rabies.
5. Remember that farm
animals sometimes have rabies
too.
6. Bites and scratches received
from animals should have
prompt attention from your
family physician.
