
Two injuries in collisions

2. Avoid contact with all wild animals. Do not attempt to pet or feed any fox, skunk, raccoon, woodchuck, muskrat, rabbit, squirrel, chipmunk.

3. If your own pet is ill or behiaving strangely, stay away from it until your veterinarian has made a diagnosis.

4. Family pets, particularly cats and dogs, should be immunized against rables.

5. Remember that farm animals sometimes have rabies

6. Bites and scratches received from animals should have prompt attention from your family physician.


