The myth that hard work and fun are incompatible ingredients of a sports program in this age of color TV sets and bulging waistlines is gradually being shot full of holes by the amazing Robert Little school Vikings basketball team, which will play for the championship of Halton County public schools at the O.S.D. gym in Milton tomorrow (Thursday) night.

The Robert Little cagers, who have been working towards this goal morning, noon and night since school started in September ended the reign of Georgetown Centennial as North Halton champs with a 21-20 victory last week, then upset Burlington Tecumseh 29-25 in the county semi-final in Milton Monday.

Never before in this writer's memory has a local team worked so hard, yet had so much fun doing it. The result is certainly a reflection on the coaching ability of John Kavanaugh, a pedagogue who has earned the total respect of students both on the basketball court and in the classroom.

"John has had those boys in that gym at 8 in the morning, noon hour and sometimes after school every day since November. This has taken a lot of the man's time and the staff and students are most grateful for what he has done for the school," says Robert Little principal Garnet "Pat" McKenzic.

The confidence the players have in their coach was evident Monday when they followed instructions to the letter to break up a full court press the Tecumseh team applied in the dying minutes. Instead of panicking, they calmly passed the ball around killing valuable seconds on the clock in the process.

The development of two players in particular, Matt Spehar and Brian Larsen is ample proof of John's ability to teach basketball fundamentals. There probably isn't a better public school basketball player in the county than Spehar who makes more amazing plays every time out, thriving on superior competition.

If you think beating a Burlington school was not such a great feat, relate the situation to the struggles Acton minor hockey teams experienced against triple "A" category teams like Burlington and Oakville. When was the last time an Acton hockey team took a series from the two giants to the south? As recently as never!

Would the ratio of available players be something like 2 to 1 in favor of senior schools like Tecumseh and Centennial?

"More like 4 to 1," claims Halton Board of Education trustee Tom Watson, who estimates the Burlington school's quantity of Grade 8 classes at nine. Robert Little has two Grade 8 classes.

It's hardly surprising that the Acton-Nassagaweya trustee has arranged for period scores of Thursday's game to be relayed to Burlington where he'll be attending a regular board meeting.

Win or lose the RL Vikings are bound to put forth an effort that will justify the pride Acton and North Halton has felt from their already impressive list of victories.

Fergus "Green Machine" manager Neil O'Sullivan was not surprised to hear Sabre president Kerwin McPhail suggest the local juniors might apply for entry to the Southern Counties league next season.

"After the hosing Acton took in this league this year, I wouldn't blame them," Neil told me Sunday.




