Acton Council will follow up a suggestion from Councillor Earl Masales that the town investigate the feasibility of participating in the new federal-provincial integrated housing program announced by Urban Affairs Minister Ron Basford Monday night.

The Minister announced three new housing programs which are designed to encourage a greater mix of low income and higher income residents. On one program the government would provide loans for apartment and town house projects that would set aside 25 per cent of the units for low income tenants.


