Masales asks council to consider integrate housing

Acton Council will follow up a suggestion from Councillor Earl Masales that the town investigate the feasibility of participating in the new federal-provincial integrated housing program announced by Urban Affairs Minister Ron Basford Monday night.

The Minister announced three new housing programs which are designed to encourage a greater mix of low income and higher income residents. On one program the government would provide loans for apartment and town house projects that would set aside 25 per cent of the units for low income tenants. The second would grant loans for projects where five per cent of the units would be leased to low

income tenants and the third would allow some middle income tenants to be included in public housing projects. Stop ghettos The new proposals are designed to stop the ghetto mentality some subsidized housing has supposedly developed by mixing people of all incomes in the same housing development. Instead of contracting low income housing in one place and homes for higher incomes in another. As Councillor Masales saw it perhaps any requirements Acton might need could be worked into the Acton Meadows subdivision, where plans for the third phase are being processed. He got instant support from the deputy reeve Peter Marks. As he understood it the town bought blocks of land in the subdivision for subsidized housing and the province and federal government assisted with the project. Retiring clerk Joe Hurst said this might solve any future senior citizen housing plans in Acton because the most recent survey

Hydro gives second phase of development approval

There's no reason why we can't enter into an agreement with you on the second phase similar to phase one," acting Hydro Commission chairman Ted Tyler advised Kingham Hill Estates developer Alf Berry and his consultant Roger Cunningham at a meeting of the commission Thursday.

Mr. Berry told the commission he and Mr. Cunningham were present to request the second 63 home phase of the condominium development on the "cemetery hill" be processed in the same manner as the first phase. "The arrangement with Mr. Mason was satisfactory," Mr. Berry said and he felt this was a mutual feeling between the commission and Alteo Construction, the developers. "We are pleased and happy," agreed Tyler, suggesting the commission would go ahead on the same basis as phase one with adjustments for the higher price of materials.

Electric heating Mr. Berry said Alteo would install electric heating in phase two as they had in phase one, but plans were yet uncertain for phase three where condominiums would be mixed with detached homes. Electric heating entitles the developer to a \$100 rebate for each home. Hydro superintendent Doug Mason reviewed work at the development, noting all underground wiring was in for the first phase, and all that was needed was to bring wires into homes. He felt prices for material would be pretty close to that which applied for the 76 homes in phase one. Asked by Commissioner Bob MacArthur how many local people had bought homes in the first phase, Mr. Berry estimated about one-third, with others coming from Georgetown, Milton and Erin and as far away as Mississauga. Because of spiralling cost he said prices would be higher in the second phase of the low cost project. He said 85 per cent of the homes in the first phase had been sold and it could have been sold out three times over if there was no income limit for purchasers. Berry predicted that when the project was landscaped in the Spring it would be one of the most attractive places in the area and would become increasingly so for would-be buyers from Toronto, because of Acton's ideal location. The commission agreed that as soon as final payments were made for the first phase they would sign a new agreement. They would also return Alteo \$100 per home for installing electric heating, as provided.

Study budget The Commission also studied the 1973 budget at the meeting Thursday but decided to leave it until the April meeting when more information was available on costs for the Bovis subdivision. They asked the superintendent to supply costing figures. Mayor Les Duby urged hydro superintendent Doug Mason to see if he could do anything to improve conditions at Acton Boulevard which had been caused by construction work along the road adjacent to the high school and M.Z. Bennett school. Digging there during the freeze-up had created a mess and the problem was compounded by the early break-up of the weather. The mayor said he received several complaints about conditions and one motorist had raked his car up attempting to navigate through mud and potholes. He said council was looking at the Boulevard with a view to solving current traffic problems which are compounded by new development in the Bovis subdivision. The superintendent felt that hydro work there had been cleaned up but one other contractor had left the area in a messy condition. Also undecided was whether the commission should purchase two-way radios for hydro trucks.

Let's talk about HORSES

with Jennifer Barr

Question: My horse is losing his hair now and looks terrible, but I don't want to clip him. What can I do to make him look better till the warm weather? How long will it be until he looks shiny?

Answer: The horse has two coats in the winter, a short dense undercoat and a long coarse overcoat. The length and thickness of these coats depends on his breed, the warmth of the stable, whether or not he is blanketed, and how long he is outside. Sometime towards the end of the winter, he will start to shed the long outer coat. This seems to take forever and the horse gets tattered and tattered, suddenly looking thinner and down-trodden. At this time, it is wise to cover him with a large sheet and pretend he's someone else's.

But one warm day in May, a swan will emerge, and you'll be aware your horse really is very glamorous. He will look dappled for a couple of weeks as his downy undercoat sheds. You can help his appearance by using a lot of elbow grease, grooming and hand-rubbing - this will get his muscles in shape. Trim the long hairs along the jaw line and in the ears. Clip a little path, pull the mane and tail for a neater appearance. After the spring mud has dried up, trim the long hair on the fetlocks and around the hockheads. One hint: while waiting for your new to emerge, don't visit any friends who have sleek Arab or Thoroughbred in warm barns. Their sleek shine in the middle of March will make you want to kick something. Instead, try tramping through the mud to see other shaggy beasts and yours will look good again.
