## Suggests farmers pay sons salary

By D. H. Miles Area Co-ordinator and Farm **Management Specialist** 

This is the time of year when many people are wrestling with their 1972 farm receipts and expenses to determine their taxable income, either to fill out their own income tax forms or to give it to their accountant to do it for them.

In reviewing your expenses, did you have as an item, salary to your son at least partially equivalent to the services he performed on the farm last year, that is, services he performed that might otherwise have required outside hired help? If not in 1972, maybe consideration should be given to do that in 1973. Pay the son a salary and let him buy his own books for school, his own clothes and use his own spending money.

Can carn \$1,850.

This son, if he is over 16, can earn up to \$1,050 and still qualify a a decendent Children under age 16 can earn up to \$1,000.

Children going to University and paying their own tuition, board and lodging could earn a greater salary than is mentioned above on the amounts of these two items. If tuition was \$500 and he was in residence for eight months at a cost of \$50 a month,

his earnings could total an additional \$900 or his total salary could be \$1,950.

Keep in mind this could be an expense to the farm business but the salary must be in line with the services he performs to the

Re-resd the section in your 1972 income Tax Forms, Page 4, Claim for Personal Exemptions, under Maximum Exemption for Wholly Dependent children. Further details on this farm management item can be discussed with your accountant or income tax office.

Any savings he keeps out of the salary can in time be used to buy into dad's business if he so desires. During this interval he is a business man, deciding how to handle his own money.



### Christmas Seal campaign totals record \$56,659

The 1972 Christmas Seal campaign recently completed in Halton County by the Halton County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, fur exceeded the donations of last year's campaign. This was announced by Association president H. H. Hinton of Acton at a recent meeting of the board of directors in Milton.

Total contributions at the close of the campaign amounted to \$50,659.57, n 13.9 per cent increase over the previous campaign's \$49,737.24. Chairman and director of the campaign was C. L. McFadden, Burlington.

Christmas Seal contributions are used to pay for a wide variety of services and assistance to sufferers of respiratory diseases in Halton County, as well as an extensive testing program to detect respiratory diseases at an early stage to enable early treatment. Halton County also helps support a national and worldwide campaign to fight tuberculosis and respiratory diseases.

Check abnormalities

Pulmonary Function Testing, a program undertaken in recent years to detect respiratory diseases, has been carried out by Mrs. Sheila Brown, a technician employed by the Halton County TB and RD Association. Mrs. Brown reports that in 1972 a total of 6,378 people were tested in 76 industrial plants in the County. This is a feww testing program conducted on a voluntary basis, with emphasis wherever possible on industrial plants with a risk of respiratory disease due to unfavorable environment. Where

breathing abnormalities are suspected the tested person is urged to consult the family physician, and the results of the test are sent to that physician. Through this testing program a significant number of suspected cases have been detected and early treatment nude possible.

A strong approach is made to students in the Hulton County school system in an effort to discourage smoking, by far the preatest cause of respiratory Illness. This is under the direction of Mrs. J. Armour, the Association's education director, who must constantly keep educational materials updated and ensure that they are given the widest possible use.

The Association's staff social worker, Mrs. Mary Kennedy, a registered nurse, maintains a constant contact with TB and respiratory patients both in and out of hospitals in the county. It is her responsibility to visit, and

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
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
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
