## Requests grant of \$20,000

When Halton County Council gathers next week to discuss budget estimates members will consider a grant request from Oakville Council for a \$20,000 grant for Fronte Harbor. Oakville Reeve Allan Masson said the town of Oakville had contributed \$50,000 to the Oakville Harbor Control Board. He noted the grant would go towards development of the harbor, dredging and provision of launching and docking facilities for sailing and power craft. Masson indicated a meeting of the administration committee that a real need existed for the work and he added that all berths in Oakville harbors were full and anyone interested in finding a berth for their boat was out of luck. Dave Coons opposed the request but other committee members agreed to forward the request and let council handle it.

## Christmas Seal campaign totals record \$56,659

The 1972 Christmas Seal campaign recently completed in Halton County by the Halton County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association, far exceeded the donations of last year's campaign. This was announced by Association president H. H. Hinton of Acton at a recent meeting of the board of directors in Milton. Total contributions at the close of the campaign amounted to \$56,659.57, a 13.9 per cent increase over the previous campaign's \$49,737.24. Chairman and director of the campaign was C. L. McEadden, Burlington.

Through this testing program a significant number of suspected cases have been detected and early treatment made possible. A strong approach is made to students in the Halton County school system in an effort to discourage smoking, by far the greatest cause of respiratory illness. This is under the direction of Mrs. J. Armour, the Association's education director, who must constantly keep educational materials updated and ensure that they are given the widest possible use.

The Association's staff social worker, Mrs. Mary Kennedy, a registered nurse, maintains a constant contact with TB and respiratory patients both in and out of hospitals in the county. It is her responsibility to visit, and make recommendations to the Board of Directors concerning the purchase and use of respiratory equipment by these patients, as well as other assistance to them. Mrs. J. Lannu, the executive secretary, is responsible for the day to day operation of the Association business. Once each year she organizes and supervises the distribution of requests for donations to all residents of Halton County. This year the mailing totalled 52,654 letters, plus a large amount of follow-up mail. This is followed by the immense job of receiving and tabulating donations and sending out receipts.
