

# Blow Press captures industrial crown

Blow Press produced two stong periods of hockey and turned back a strong finish by Ken's Auto Service Sunday night to wrap up the Acton industrial hockey league championship with a 12-9 win.

The pressmen were upset in the opening game of the best two of three series, 7-2 by the automen, but came back to tie the series with a cliff-hanging 5-4 decision in the second game. Sunday night they were full measure for the win which followed an exciting climb to the league top during the regular season.

Jim Kavanaugh was the champion's big gun, scoring four goals and assisting on two. John Goy also tallied six points with three markers and as many assists, with Dave Papillon notching three goals and helping on another.

**Pivot** Jim McDonald scored one and helped on two while Bob Fitzpatrick drilled one. Two assists apiece were chalked up by Gord Allen, Larry McAfee and Les King while Butch Rees and Jake McKenzie each accounted for one.

Dan Kavanaugh set the pace for the automen as he blazed three goals past the pressmen's twine tender Roy Smith and helped with four more. Bob Andrews and Lorne Gordon each scored a pair with Bob also earning four assists. Phil Marzo bagged a goal and an assist, as did Rick Livermore.

Bill Coon chalked up three assists, Cliff Nelson got two, and goalie Grant Usher, Gary Kelley and Harry Jackson each earned one to round out the loser's scoring.

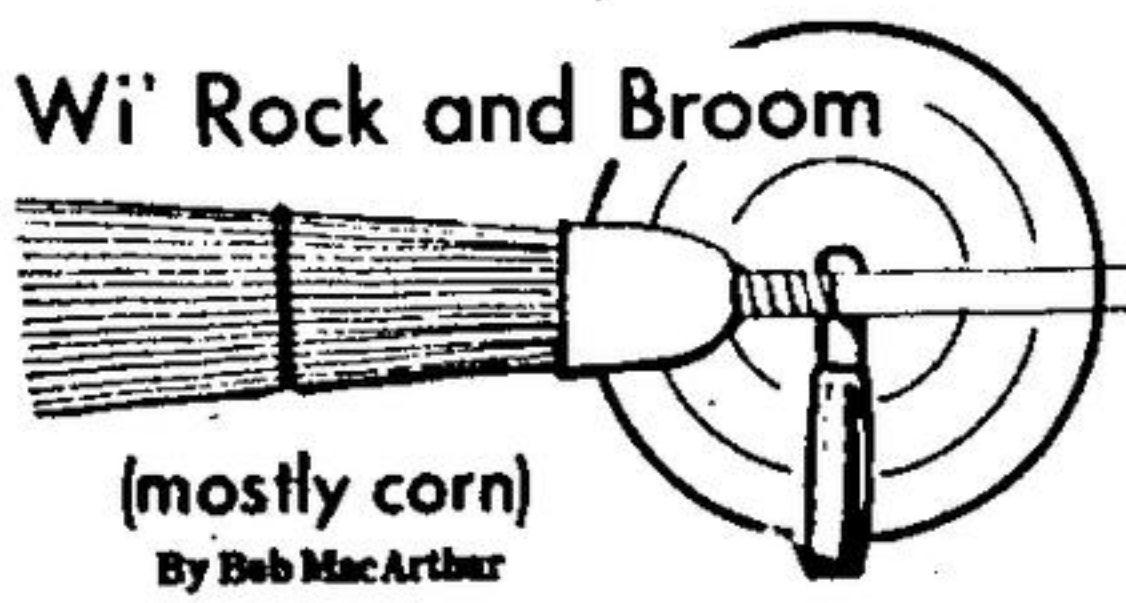
## Abby Hoffman joins faculty
