Won't rename H.R.C.A. park
It was decided that Campbellville Conservation Area will not be named after Nussagaweya Township's first lady reeve and Halton County Warden, Mrs. Anne MacArthur at a Halton Region Conservation Authority meeting, held Thursday, March 29.
The issue came up following a Rockwood man's letter to Halton County Council's administration committee who referred the matter to H.R.C.A. which operates the park.
