### NOTICE OF APPLICATION BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF ACTON To Dispense with a Vote of the Electors

#### TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. THE Council of the Corporation of the Town of Acton intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the reconstruction of Elizabeth Drive, from Main Street North to Elmore Drive, in order to improve the roadway to acceptable standards. The following works are to be completed:

- (a) Excavation to new subgrade.
- (b) Place granular base course.
- (c) Construct storm sewer and catchbasins.
- (d) Construct curbs and sidewalks.
- (e) Construct asphalt pavement.
- (f) Sod disturbed areas.

The total length of the proposed work is 750 feet at an estimated cost of \$47,000.00, whereof the amount of \$24,865.00 shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable out of the general rate over a period not exceeding ten (10) years.

2. APPLICATION will be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works. Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one (21) days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the Town of Acton, at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such approval and the grounds of such objection.

3. THAT the Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.
