An amendment to that effect by

Georgetown Trustee Ernie Singleton suggested that because a person was appointed to a headship didn't mean he would still hold that position 20 years

Singleton said that unlike the headship system, where a head must have received a specialist degree in his subject area to be considered for the appointment, a chairman won't necessarily be a specialist. There will be more emphasis on leadership and less

on credentials, he suggested. Burlington trustee Fred Armitage noted only one third of the teachers have sufficient academic standing to qualify for appointments under the headship system now. He indicated many good leaders were being overlooked because they lacked certain certificates.

Allowances under the old system would provide an additional \$2,000 for a head, \$1,150 for a minor head and \$1,000 for an
