Dear Mrs. Bouakill:

Your letter of March 20th, enclosing a copy of the motion dated March 19th, 1973 by Esquering Council stating that the Council are concerned about the proposal by the Canadian National Railway and Anglo-Canadian for the disposal of Metro-Toronto garbage at Indusmin Quarries, is acknowledged.

Metropolitan Toronto received a proposal some months ago from CN Railways for refuse disposal which did consider using the Indusmin Quarries. This proposal is not now being actively pursued.

A proposal has also been received from Anglo-Canadian Recycling with possible use of the Indusmin Quarries. However, our preliminary studies and informal discussions with the Company do not envisage use of the quarry at this time.

# Fourth Line delegation joshes council

A three man delegation from the top lots on the Fourth Line kept Esquering councillors and spectators chortling Monday night as they pleaded something be done about the road in front of their properties.

Good-naturedly joshing council, spokesman Ralph Denny said it had been 40 years since any major road work had been done on the last three lots in the

township—in fact, Councillor Leslie's father had been on council when the last major repair was done.

He and John Cole and Jack Denny interspersed jibes at the road's condition with pleas that the road should be raised higher than the ditches to prevent flooding and allow some drainage. Mr. Cole said previous dumping of material on the road was useless because it was mostly mud. He advocated crushed stone.

"It's the lowest of any tender,

boys," said Ralph Denny with a grin. Then seriously, "We're going behind on roads in this municipality."

Best stuff

Both the reeve and road superintendent maintained only government approved gravel was put on the road and superintendent Snow reminded the delegation there road was not the only one in the township who needed road repairs. The reeve said if they had been there earlier they would have heard approval given for 25,000 yards of gravel.

"You'll have to raise the mill rate and get the taxes higher to do it then," maintained Mr. Denny. The reeve said nothing could be done without government approval.

Second Year

"It's pretty darn bad when you have to go in second gear for three lots," clipped in Mr. Denny. "You fellas all live on good roads and there used to be good roads in the township." He said the milk truck had been stuck front and rear one day

recently and this couldn't be tolerated.

The reeve promised they would inspect that section of the Fourth Line on the upcoming road tour which drew an immediate response from Mr. Denny. He said council shouldn't leave it to June when it was all dried up.

Griming, the reeve promised. "If you don't do anything with the road I'll have to go back to drawing milk with a team and wagon," said Mr. Denny retreating from council chambers.

## Acton charges heard in court

In court in Milton this week two youths were sentenced to 30 days for obstructing police.

A local man was convicted of selling a restricted weapon without a permit. The gun was confiscated and he received six months probation.

Impaired driving

An Acton man convicted of impaired driving received six months suspension and a \$350 fine.

A Georgetown man charged with dangerous driving received three months suspension and a \$250 fine.

Three local boys charged with causing a disturbance were assessed a \$50 fine each.

These charges were laid by Acton detachment of the O.P.P.

## Liquor charges

A variety of incidents were investigated by Acton police during the week including several liquor charges.

A Churchill Rd. N. man Wednesday reported the theft of golf clubs, cart and bag from his garage. Value was placed at \$180.

A local youth was arrested for failing to appear in court.

Windows broken

On Monday damage to the feed mill was reported to police. Windows on the south side had been broken by stones. Estimated value was \$40.

Children were reported playing at a construction site.

Wilful damage was reported at one of the laundromats, when blocks under the machines had been knocked out.

A car was reported stolen Tuesday.

Liquor charges

There were seven liquor charges laid, of impaired driving, failing the breath test and minors consuming. There was also a disturbance at one of the hotels investigated, with those involved dispersing on arrival of police.
