A total of 343 night calls were made with approximately 98 per cent of total visits to patients with medical or surgical problems.

Ill health forces bishop to retire

Joseph F. Ryan has decided to resign as bishop of the huge Roman Catholic diocese of Hamilton, which includes all the perishes in Halton and Welling-

Pope Paul VI has accepted the resignation which was forced by the ill health that kept the bishop in hospital during January and February. The administration of the diocese was in the hands of his assistant, Bishop Paul Reding, during his absence.

During his 35 years as head of the Hamilton diocese, Bishop Ryan has seen the population double as well as the number of churches and schools under his jurisdiction. He took a special interest in Catholic education, especially at the high school level. His most difficult task in the high school field was keeping grades 11, 12 and 13 going since they receive no provincial

52 years in diocese

Associated with the diocese for 52 years, the bishop was ordained a priest in May, 1921, and later in the year appointed assistant at

the former St. Marys Cathedral in Hamilton. In 1925 he became paster of the cathedral and the following year left for three years of study in Rome. He was reappointed rector of the cathedral on his return and when the new cathedral of Christ the King was opened in 1933 he was named

In 1937 Joseph Ryan was appointed Bishop of Hamilton after a two month stint as administrator and he has become well known over the seven and a half counties which constitute the diocese. He often came here to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation. An able speaker, he intends to assist Blahop Redling for several more months.

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NOTICE OF APPLICATION BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF ACTON To Dispense with a Yote of the Electors

TAKE NOTICE THAT:

- 1. THE Councilof the Corporation of the Town of Acton Intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the reconstruction of Elizabeth Drive, from Main Street North to Elmore Drive, in order to improve the roadway to acceptable standards. The following works are to be completed:
- (a) Excavation to new subgrade. (b) Place granular base course.
- (c) Construct storm sewer and catchbasins.
- (d) Construct curbs and sidewalks.
- (e) Construct asphalt pavement.

(f) Sod disturbed areas.

The total length of the proposed work is 750 feet at an estimated cost of \$47,000.00, whereof the amount of \$24,865.00 shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable out of the general rate over a period not exceeding ten (10) years.

- 2. APPLICATION will be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works. Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one (21) days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the Town of Acton, at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such approval and the grounds of such objection.
- 3. THAT the Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.
