What council did

At their regular meeting Tuesday, April 10 Acton Council dealt with the following items of business: —Passed a by-law to authorize the debenturing of \$37,400 for the extension of the watermain project on the Erin-Esqueving Town line, north of town. —Passed a by-law to authorize reconstruction on Elizabeth Drive from Main St. north to Elmwood Drive. Estimated cost of the project is \$47,000 with the town's share being \$24,865 and the Department of Transportation and Communication paying the remaining \$22,135. —Public works committee members informed council they have set Tuesday, May 1, as a tentative date for their annual road tour. Mayor Dudy said two road tours may be arranged instead of one. —Councillor Norm Elliott suggested council should assure residents of Longfield Road problems they have experienced in connection with the installation of a gas line there last fall will be corrected. Clerk-administrator Grant Usher said he had been assured by gas company officials a spring cleanup of the street will take place. —At an administration committee meeting, Monday, April 2, property and cemetery committee chairman Councillor Norm Elliott said he would be getting estimates for erecting a fence around Fairview Cemetery and that he would be proceeding with a tree planting program in the cemetery. —Also at the administration committee meeting a discussion took place regarding the possibility of land around Fairy Lake being donated to the town for park purposes. The item was placed on the agenda for the next regular committee meeting. Mayor Len Dudy presided for the two and a half hour meeting. All councillors were present except Deputy-Reeve Peter Marks who was detained on business in the U.S.

O.P.P. list cycling tips

The reporting week of April 15 to April 22, proved to be busy for the Acton detachment officers of the Ontario Provincial Police. Officers investigated a total of 38 general occurrences, ranging from reports of missing persons to complaints of abandoned dogs. Major occurrences investigated included four complaints of willful damage, the theft of an auto, one complaint of assault, one drug seizure and three liquor seizures. Arrests made during the week included two persons wanted by other police agencies, the arrest of an out-of-town man for driving while under suspension and the arrest of a local man for being drunk in public. Charges laid: Investigations resulted in six charges under the Criminal Code, six charges under the Liquor Control Act and one charge under the Narcotic Control Act. There were no reportable motor vehicle collisions during the reporting week. Two persons were charged with Impaired Driving and one person was charged with driving without insurance. Traffic rules: If your child rides a bicycle, make sure he knows and obeys the traffic rules for safe cycling. Here are some tips for safer cycling: (1) Signal turns and stops with the proper signals... out and up for a right turn... out and down for a left turn... out and down for a stop. (2) After signalling, return your left hand to the handle bars promptly... and keep both hands on the handle bars. (3) Ride in single file... close to the curb. (4) Carry parcels in a carrier... not in your hand. And remember, a regulation bike is for one rider... no passengers allowed. —Prov. Const. Paul Brown

Clifford, program director, arranged an ethnic amalgam followed by a wine tasting survey sponsored by Bright's wines. Members of the Association have been very disappointed that their planned adult residence has met a snag. They had been negotiating for a 10-acre parcel of land in Esqueving, but neighbors opposed the location of the residence near them. The building committee is presently negotiating for another piece of property. The residence would be for retarded adults to live in a home-like setting. This type of supervision is a growing trend, replacing large institutions such as the Orillia hospital. Only persons who would adapt well to this situation would live in the home, the organizers explain.
