## Three firsts for Acton High

Acton High athletes fared well in a dual track meet held at Milton high school last week. Milton High, Lord Elgin High of Burlington and Milton OSD also took part in the meet.

Danny Thomson and Rodger McEachern topped the list of Acton winners with a first and

second place finish each. Thomson hurled the discus 133 feet, seven inches to place first in the midget age bracket and came second in the shot putt with a toss of 38 feet, eight inches.

Wins race McEachern took first place in the junior 440 yard dash in a time

of 56 seconds flat. He also grabbed second place in the 800 metre event in a time of 2:14.1. A third Acton first place finisher was Maureen Gerth in the junior girls' shot putt. She recorded a toss of 32 feet, two inches. She also entered the discus event, throwing 66 feet, six inches.

### HRCA briefs

During a Thursday, April 26 meeting, members of Halton Region Conservation Authority:

—Agreed to bore a well on the Griffith property at Scotch Block Dam at a cost of \$1,000 if Mr. Griffith would drop his claim of \$90,000 for the loss of water rights.

—Decided to contact the Chairmen's Committee of authorities to see how their finances were being spent. The Halton Authority noted that their required share had more than doubled from last year to \$483.

The total budget of the committee is \$16,547 with Metro Toronto feeling the heaviest load at \$2,500.

—Reviewed regulations concerning the Authority's riding horse rental concession in Kelso Park. The Authority felt that although new regulations dictate operators must provide a barn and proper facilities to house horses, this did not apply to their situation because it only operates in the summer. The Ministry of Agriculture and Food has been contacted on the matter.

Finishes fourth Glen McKenzie finished fourth in the 1500 metre event in a time of 4:47 and Frank Houston was fifth in 4:47.5. Craig Sommerville (5:00) and Cliff Creasey (5:19.2) were also entered.

Times of 2:25, 2:27 and 2:33 were recorded in the 800 metre event by Frank Houston, Craig Sommerville and Cliff Creasey respectively. Coach Bruce Andrews is making plans to stage a dual meet here in Acton sometime before the Halton County championships, May 9 and 10.

## Approve age change for Junior "D" play

An Acton Sabre amendment to the O.H.A. constitution changing the number of players a Junior "D" may be allowed to dress from 16 to 17 (including two

goalies) was approved at the O.H.A. annual meeting in Toronto Saturday.

Two other Sabre Amendment proposals, one calling for Junior

"D" teams to be allowed to draw players from municipalities within a 25 mile radius having a population of up to 20,000 and the second changing the number of homebrew players Junior "D" teams must dress for each game from four to eight were withdrawn by Sabre representatives after they failed to gain support at the morning Junior "D" category session.

Age change  
Of particular interest to Sabre fans was approval of an amendment proposed by the Gananogue Junior "C" club which will permit players in the Junior "C" and "D" categories an extra year of playing eligibility. Although approved by O.H.A. membership teams, the change must still go before the CAHA annual meeting for approval. If it passes there, six Sabre players Ted Harmer, Randy Weldon, Gord Murray, Gary Louth, Brad Timbers and John Snow would be able to return next season. Under present regulations they are overage.

The possibility of the South Central league being elevated to Junior "C" was discussed but no decision was made.

No discussion  
Newly-elected Sabre president Bill Morrison told the Free Press there was no discussion about Sabres transferring to the Southern Counties league. The possibility was mentioned during the playoff disagreement Sabres had with league convenor Bill Church.

Representing Sabres at Saturday's meeting were president Bill Morrison, secretary-treasurer June Gerth and executive members Bob Marshall and Bessie Fisher.
