ings to back his accusation. Council had earlier expressed concern that pit traffic would use Five Sideroad and Guelph Line, thereby going through the main section of the village.

A decision on the matter was postponed upon request from the Council's lawyer at an Ontario Municipal Board meeting Jan. 8. Council suggested they could get together with the pit operators to solve the traffic problem. Then at an April 9 Council meeting another route was proposed. The suggestion was to build a road along the property line through the centre of lots six and seven, just north of the village. Council agreed to this suggestion if it were built at a 100 per cent cost to the pit operators.

"Blackmail" Mr. Agnew pointed out that if this road were built it would take all gravel traffic out of the town. open up new lot areas and could bypass a great deal of the race-track traffic out of the village. "If we have to build this road at a 100 per cent cost and other people use it, this would be a form of black-

mail," he commented. The heated dispute between the two parties continued for nearly 20 minutes. At one point Reeve MacArthur fumed, "There is no personal vendetta as far as I can see. I'm above that sort of thing and I resent it very much because it would not matter to me who owned that pit. I don't care if it won't work anywhere," he said. were the Premier of Ontario."




Former owners Ray and Bill Thompson presented a Lazy-boy chair to Gordon and flowers to his wife Jean.
