Tuesday night's Acton council meeting ended at 9.30 p.m. All members were present.

Various items were dealt with or reported through minutes of committee meetings.

About 20 home owners have placed orders for trees under this year's program. Superintendent Duby was authorized to purchase between 20 and 25 trees for the cemetery, town reservoir, disposal plant and other townowned property.

Some residents wish to plant trees on town-owned boulevards. These plantings will have to be approved by Mr. Duby to determine cases where they might interfere with future road widening or overhead hydro

Brent Marshall was engaged by the public works committee as municipal town foreman, his salaried duties to commence May Applications were perused by the committee at their meeting, also attended by the town superintendent Alf Duby.

Legalities of selling lots at the cometery are to be investigated. Money received from the sale of lots could go toward a mausoleum in the cemetery. Both committees of council have considered the matter. The official plan and zoning by-law would have to be amended.

Cemetery boundaries will be staked out by surveyors so a new fence will be located in the proper place. Prices for erecting a fence at the cemetery have been received by the public works committee.



Useful device The device is useful in the control of air pollution since it takes solld particles out of dirty air by the use of electricity. Dirty air is pumped into the precipitator, a 20,000 volt DC current is passed through wires in the device and dirt particles are collected on 17 lead plates located below the wires. These plates are electrifled with a negative charge. A power source converts AC current into DC reducing the voltage from 110 to 6. Six volts DC are then passed
