## 400 boys plant 25,000 trees in North Halton project

Saturday, May 5, saw approximately 400 cubs, scouts and venturers of the North Halton District Boy Scouts plant 25,000 trees and shrubs purchased from the Ministry of Natural Resources at local wildlife areas under the management of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

Group Committee members provided transportation and helped leaders and Rovers supervise the enthusiastic tree planters. Planting sites were mainly located in the area of Orangeville Dam with another site at Terra Cotta.

Fund-raising The multi-purpose project has aroused considerable interest in the Scouting organization and met with an outstanding response from the community as a fund raising venture with each boy being sponsored for each tree he plants.

In its second year the project provides a challenge to the boys

in the open air. The trees remain as a permanent reminder of this constructive scouting activity with the long term benefit of enhancing the environment.

Red pine, white pine, spruce and shrubs were planted to provide wildlife habitat and form windbreaks in addition to preventing soil erosion and in proving the aesthetic quality of the area.

Warm praise Andy Fenton, project coordinator, North Halton District Council, had warm praise for the cooperation received from Bob Baker, the Credit Valley Conservation Authority forestry technician, and his staff who obtained the trees from the Department of Natural Resources and staked out the areas in preparation for planting.

Boys from Acton, Georgetown, Ashgrove, Ballinafad, Glen Williams, Limehouse, Norval and Scotch Block participated in the project.
