Spruce budworm

Spruce budworm has become a common pest for the home gardener in recent years. It is considered to be one of the most destructive insects of North America. Damage of spruce, hemlock and pines is done by the worms or larva of this insect.
These worms, about an inch long, are dark brown with a yellowish stripe down each side of its body and is dotted with yellowish spots. These worms

feed heavily on the buds of spruce trees and become full grown in June and July. If numerous larva are present, the tree can easily be defoliated and appears to be scorched by fire.
Trees should be sprayed just after the buds open in the spring. No insecticide can correct damage that has already occurred. Spruce bud-worm can be controlled with carbaryl (Sevin). Follow the directions on the label. The manufacturer knows the limitations of his product.
