

Plan to form sports council

Acton Parks and Recreation committee decided Monday night to take steps to establish a sports council.

A council involving representatives of all sports organizations within Acton would make the town eligible for higher provincial grants.

Doug Collison, recreation director in Georgetown, addressed the local recreation committee regarding steps Georgetown was taking in establishing a sports council. He pointed out it would link small recreation organizations with the municipal government and would strengthen their stand in dealings with the public. It would also give town people the opportunity to join a group overseeing recreation in Acton and would give organizations more bargaining power in agreements

with local schools regarding the use of facilities.

Collison analysed the situation in Mississauga where a sports council has already been set up. They have set up area committees, he said, with another group presiding over them in charge of finances and programs.

Smaller committees to create a situation where the council is small enough to deal

with matters efficiently it may be necessary to have minor sports groups form one committee and send representatives to a larger committee. Mr. Collison hoped there could be an agreement regarding access to the minutes between Acton, Georgetown and Esquimes councils and hoped the three councils would be able to co-operate regarding the in-

terchange of programs and ideas. The Acton committee was concerned with finding the 'pitfalls' before they proceeded. Councillor Barry Incoe suggested the committee contact the Sports and Fitness Council in Toronto and work through Queen's Park regarding creation of the council. Committee member Lou

Bonnette said it might be wise to contact other small towns who have previously had regional government imposed on them. It was agreed the sports council will act independently of the Parks Board and that their responsibility was only to call it together. Committee member Ed Wood volunteered to represent the committee on the new council.

Rams rally in third to defeat East York

Each team scored once in the first period, Cooksley breaking up a scoreless tie with an underhand shot from 75 feet out after 12 minutes of play and Nevin McCallum tying the score for East York two minutes later. After Keith Tsuzuda scored early in the second period to make it 2-1 for the visitors, Rams bounced back to take a 4-2 lead when Kevin Marcoux netted a pair of pretty goals in the space of five minutes and Cooksley tallied his second goal of the game.

The score East York tied the score in the third period when Dave Archibald and Jeff Tanner connected, before Rams poured it on to net seven goals with only one reply from the Mohawks.

Besides Cooksley's three third period goals Rick 'Woody' Newman scored twice and Glen McKenzie and George Artem each scored once. Ram goalie Gary Turkosz was charged by Blaine Tanner of East York on one of his many sorties from the net and a fight broke out which resulted in fighting penalties to both players and game misconduct to Turkosz who continued to chase his adversary after the initial scrap had ended. Dave Manes also was given a game misconduct for leaving the players' bench and Acton's Jim Burnham got the heave-ho later for what he said was merely asking the referee a question.

Coaches unhappy Both the Mohawk coach and

Jim McNabb took over in the Ram nets after Turkosz left and allowed only one goal, that by Blaine Tanner with less than two minutes left in the game.

Glen McKenzie qualified for the senior boys' 3000 metres when he placed fourth in a time of 9:58. Maureen Gerth will represent the Acton High girls at Oakville next week, as she placed third in the junior girls' shot putt event with a toss of 31 feet 10 inches.
