## Township protects its \$60,000 reserve fund

In a move to ensure regional government does not drain township coffers, Esquesing council passed a resolution Monday authorizing preparation of a new capital reserve by-law to ensure the \$60,000 fund is spent within the present existing boundaries of the township.

The move was obviously also timed to coincide with a Georgetown proposal that the \$60,000 unallocated in the capital reserve fund be given towards a new sports complex in Georgetown.

Esquesing councillors felt they must have some means of controlling the capital fund, although it is possible money could later be donated to a similar or that particular project.

The township does not seem to have any present use for the funds but if the money could be absorbed by the region if it is still there without adequate protection when regional government arrives.

Council also made no objection to a proposal for a raffle by the Limehouse public school in conjunction with a garden party to be held on June 13.

Both Acton and Esquesing: Made no objections to an Acton by-law to regulate land use in the Kingham Hills estates subdivision. Basically the by-law follows a directive from the Plans Administration Branch of the Department requiring that no buildings or structures of any kind, other than those necessary for flood and erosion control, be built in Blocks A, B, C or D in the subdivision, and that no buildings be permitted within 40 feet of Block B. The blocks border wet areas of the subdivision.

Approved a building permit to William McGowan to renovate a single residential dwelling on Lot 22, Con. 10. The building had previously been used as a residence.

## Nassagaweya may obtain levy relief

Treasurers from Halton municipalities will meet June 8 to discuss Nassagaweya township's appeal of their educational levy.

The board of arbitrators, which is made up of municipal treasurers agreed at their last meeting that figures would be worked out on the same formula as last year.

The township was awarded close to \$50,000 last year as a result of the appeal. Milton treasurer Audrey Brush indicated the award would likely be in the same neighborhood this year if the board agreed on the decision.

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
