Plan lung tests for housewives

The Halton County Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association hopes to extend pulmonary function testing to housewives, it was decided at the association's annual meeting May 10.

Presently the TB/RD association offers pulmonary screening to industries, police and fire departments and municipal offices, the latter three being innovations just this year. The association feels it would be beneficial to the residents of Halton County to expand testing services, especially in view of the disease inducing industries within the county.

Refer to physician
This year 6,378 people were given pulmonary function screening of which 10 per cent were referred to their own

physician. Of that 10 per cent, 61 per cent were found to have a respiratory ailment.

Testing for housewives and other community residents could be set up in public buildings, said association president H. H. Hinton of Acton. He said that at present there has been no date set for the start of the new program.

As well as providing pulmonary testing the Tuberculosis and Respiratory Commission also supplies oxygen and equipment for use at home, provides respiratory treatment training for nurses and makes films available to county schools. They draw their funds from Christmas seals.

Mrs. C. W. McKim of Bronte will succeed Mr. Hinton as association president next year.

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
