## Dogs menace stock

Esqueusing council wrestled with canine problems Monday night before deciding to take the suggestion of Deputy Reeve Len Coxe about printing and circulating posters explaining township dog regulations to residents. Dogs in the township are bothering livestock. Some farmers have been forced to shoot them. Reeve Tom Hill said he has been called about the dog menace and he has advised those

bothered to call the Ontario Provincial Police to have them shot. "They are sure doing it at Speyside," he told council. But the deputy reeve said it was a problem. One elderly lady he knows can either choose to chase the dogs away or call the police. Invariably she chooses the former because by the time police arrive the dogs have vanished. If they call police first then dogs can worry an animal to death. Even one younger, able bodied farmer in Hornby has shot five dogs to protect his livestock. Dogs have raided his duck pond so there is only one duck left. Coxe said the township had to make it clear to dogowning residents what was happening. "Where's our dog catcher?" asked Wilfrid Leslie. "He goes when called," answered the deputy reeve, "but like the police when he is there the dogs aren't."

## Ladies limber up — start season

Limbered up and ready for a new and better season, Acton Ladies Football team clashes with Brookville in pre-season exhibition game 7:30 tonight (Wednesday) at Prospect Park. "The team has improved considerably over last year's squad," commented coach Ed Wood. "With a little work we could be a good playoff contender this season."

Coach Wood has worked with the ladies team since late April, staging regular Sunday and Wednesday evening practices at Robert Little and Prospect Park diamonds. Several members of the team are returnees from last year's squad or are semi-retirees from earlier ladies' teams. Games with teams from Hornby, Oakville, Mississauga, Hillsburgh, Streetsville, Georgetown and Glen Williams are on the Acton schedule this year. Home games will be played under the lights at the park, 8:15 Wednesday evenings. Teams will play regulation football rules through this year.

Bases will be 60 feet apart and the pitcher will face a batter 40 feet away. "We've been supported by several businesses in town," spoke Wood, "and we're hoping to purchase new uniforms for the team."

"Posters will be placed around town indicating home and away games and we hope to see the community rooting for us," Wood added.

Georgetown will be the competition for Acton's first home game June 6.

## Five false alarms

For the second time this year, police and firefighters join in expressing their concern over five false alarms. There have been five recently, three of them checked out and proven false before the alarm brought firefighters running. A couple of the calls were to Lakeview subdivision. Children are suspected.

O.P.P. Corp. Bob Arbour reminds parents that this is a very serious offence and there are no "warnings" when someone is apprehended.

Juveniles would be dealt with severely in juvenile court; persons over 16 would appear in criminal court. Both the judges and police consider this charge a very serious one.

**Can trace**  
The Bell Telephone Company has investigating personnel who can be called if any more false alarms are received, according to police. They have methods to trace calls which can be used here.

There were six false alarms within a short period of time early in January.

Fire Chief Mick Holmes reminds citizens the brigade is a volunteer one brought out at considerable expense to the community. When false alarms are suspected, valuable minutes could be wasted checking out the call, which might well be legitimate.

## No support for Sunday regulations

A resolution from the town of Newmarket asking for uniform store hours and regulations on the size of stores which could remain open Sundays was turned down by Esqueusing council at Monday's regular meeting.

The resolution has already been endorsed by Halton County council but Reeve Tom Hill said he personally shouldn't sit in the reeve's chair and dictate merchants should only work so many hours. He felt in the case of a new business it might be necessary to do so. He recommended council do not support it.

Deputy Reeve Len Coxe said he was not particularly concerned with the resolution because it did not matter in the rural areas.

No one on council supported it when it came to a vote.

The resolution stated the recommendations were the result of a study which indicates Sunday selling would increase retail costs considerably and that Sunday should be retained as a compulsory day of rest for the social attitudes and mental hygiene of any community. The resolution is being forwarded to most Ontario municipalities.

## O.M.B. backs committee decisions

The Ontario Municipal Board has denied two appeals from Esqueusing township residents, backing decisions by the township Committee of Adjustment. Letters from the O.M.B. to council in the matter of an appeal by Donald Peters over the refusal of the committee to allow him to convey a parcel of land, 125 feet by 351 feet from 25 acres he owns between Concessions 10 and 11, part of Lot 27, indicated the board agreed use of the land was restricted to agricultural use. The committee decided the change of land use contravened the township by-law setting out the number of separations and the O.M.B. agreed.

The committee of adjustment decided not to approve because the land was too low and it appeared very wet when it was visited. It was also suggested sewage might pollute the river. The O.M.B. decided neither the committee or the board had the power to grant the severance citing the provisions of the Planning Act and the restricted area by-law. "There are certain exceptions stated in this by-law but these do not seem to assist this applicant," the decision said. Both decisions were delivered by O.M.B. vice chairman D. Jamieson.

**Want severance**  
Another appeal by Albert and Margaret Dewdney for a severance of Lot 29, Concession 10, on Confederation St. was denied as the Board decided the evidence shows that By-law 29-69 of the township prohibits the proposed use.

The Dewdney's erected a dwelling on the central part of the holding about eight years ago. About four years ago the northern part of the land was sold and a dwelling built two years ago. This left the southerly portion vacant, on which the Dewdney's asked a severance for a dwelling.

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Wayne Burns, assistant principal at Lord Elgin High School and Nick Volpe, coordinator of physical education have been promoted to assistant superintendents in the Halton County Board of Education.
