# Thomson, Gerth make meet

Two Acton High athletes have made it to the Ontario track and field championships which will take place this weekend.

Dan Thomson won the Halton-Peel boys' midget discus championship with a toss of 43.7 metres (144 feet) last weekend and will compete in the boys' OFSSA meet at the CNE Stadium in Toronto.

By virtue of her second place finish in the Halton-Peel junior girls' shot put with a throw of 10.16 metres (33 feet) Maureen Gerth will represent Acton High in the first ever OFSSA meet for girls which will be held this weekend at the University of Guelph. Her event begins at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning.

Also in the Halton-Peel championships Frank Houston placed sixth in the junior boys' 3000 metres in a time of 10 minutes, eight seconds and Glen McKenzie completed the senior boys' 3000 metres in a time of 10:25.

Rodger McEachern ran the junior boys' 400 metres in 54.8 seconds. Maureen Gerth, Rodger McEachern, Scott Sommerville, Cliff Creasey will be competing in the regional meet for the Ontario games in Brantford, June 16.

Those who left early missed some excellent instruction from T. Matican who gave freely from his vast experience and tried to improve individual abilities.

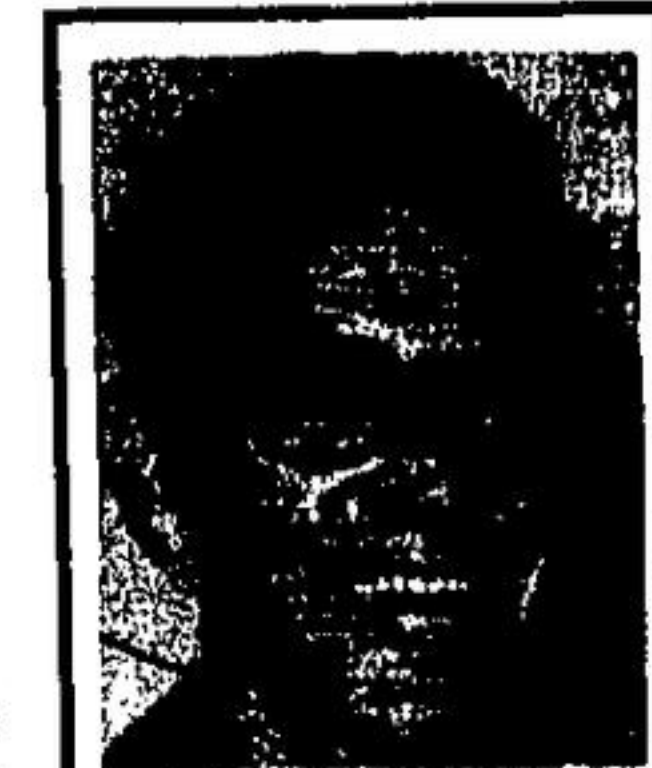
## Eno awards refused
