Alfriend from Oakville was up, a few days ago, and asked what a person could do with flank steak. She had three or four stashed away in the freezer, mainly because one came with each side of beef they'd bought over the last few years.

I dove into my little painted recipe box and came up with the following.

Italian Marinated Flank Steak At least 3 hours before cooking, place I flank steak in a shallow baking dish. Score by cutting large "diamonds" on both sides of meat. Pour 1 cup bottled Italian dressing over meat. Cover and refrigerate for 3 hours.

Preheat broiler and place steak on broiling pan. Broil 10 minutes then turn and broil 10 minutes on other side. Remove from oven, cover with thin slices of mozarella cheese (about 4 ounces) and return to broiler till cheese is melted.

Cut steak in thin slices, across the grain and serve four.

Savory Flank Steak I flank steak, scored salt and pepper 2 Thep chopped fresh paraley

1 minced clove garlic 1 1-3 cup parmesan cheese 2 Thep shortening 2 cans tomato soup diluted with same amount of water

I isp vinegar

tsp oregano Sprinkle one side of steak with salt, pepper, parsley, garlic, and cheese. Roll steak up jelly roll fashion, and secure with string.-Brown on all sides in shortening in large skillet or dutch oven.

Combine soup, (and water), vinegar, and oregano. Pour over meat and simmer, covered 3 to 4 Serve with noodles or

speghetti. Serves 4 to 8. The next recipe might seem a little vague, but it's one that I've never written down. Flank steak in any way is one of my favourite cuts, and I've been using this recipe off and on for 16 years

17?? Flank Steak

Lay a flank steak out on a cutting board. Spread it lightly with mustard and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Peel one carrot that is as long as the steak if you can find one, or use two shorter

Lay the carrots on the long edge of the steak and roll the whole thing up so the carrot is inside. Tie firmly, knotting the string every two inches or so. Cut the steak into pieces, alicing between the knots, and brown in a little fat in a heavy pan or dutch

Drain liquid from a can of peas and add water to make % cup. Add 14 cup catsup, mix well and pour over meat. Simmer 3 or 4 hours or until meat is tender. Thicken sauce with a little cornstarch, add peas, heat thoroughly and serve four, with noodles.

Now, something rather nice I came across last month. The recipe called for Whiting (fish) which I couldn't find so the logical choice seemed to be Bluefish.

Broiled Bluefish 4 bluefish fillets

4 Tosp butter season salt 4 ounces cream cheese

2 Tosp lemon juice Lay fillets on buttered broiler pan. Mix softened cream cheese

with lemon juice. Spread on fish and sprinkle with seasoned salt. Broil for approximately 8 minutes under moderate heat or until fish will flake easily when poked with a fork. Serves four.
