#### Council nixes open Sunday

Open Sundays are undesirable, Acton council agreed Tuesday night. They unanimously en-dorsed a resolution from the town of Newmarket which reads:

"That this Council endorses the recommendation of "Provincially appointed Committee on Sunday retail selling," the recommendation of the "Ontario Law Reform Commission", and the recommendation of the "Provincial store hours Association", which in essence
