We switched trains at Toronto that took us on our way to Montreal, but due to a freight train derailment near Belleville, we missed our train from Montreal to Quebec so we travelled the rest of the way by bus.

We arrived at the Chateau Frontenac at approximately 12:30 Friday afternoon, rather tired from the 14 hour journey, including waiting time of three hours. We then went out into the city, some getting something to eat, while others just browsed around.

We checked into our rooms at 3 o'clock, that even supplied us with color T.V.'s and radios. The Chateau Frontenac hotel is built like a beautiful castle, that stands

on the site of Champlain's little fort and of Frontenac's Chateau St. Louis, the governor's residence.

On Saturday we all went on a guided bus tour of Quebec (Lower Town) seeing many interesting sites, like the narrowest street in North America, the elevator that takes you from Lower Town to Upper Town through Joliet's house to Dufferin Terrace, also the Laval University - where physical education types would be overwhelmed with the huge complex, Plains of Abraham, and the Citadel, an old French fortress, on the highest point of Cape Diamond.

The rest of the day we usually had free. We could take a bus to the other parts of town, go to the wax museum, L'Artisan City Hall Square, Caleche rides, almost anything! The evening was spent swimming in the Laval

University olympic swimming pool.

Sunday morning was church of your choice e.g. Basilica, Anglican cathedral, Presbyterian. Sunday afternoon was our last tour, but it was a very interesting one. It was four hours long, and the bus stopped occasionally so we could take pictures, look around, and get some refreshments. At this one place we stopped where they sold slices of homemade bread, that was really good. We saw the famous shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre, and the beautiful Montmorency Falls dropping 274 feet from the cliffs.

Before we knew it our weekend was over, and early Monday morning we left Quebec taking the CN train all the way back home again.

The opportunities for youth programs in town will be beginning soon—band instruction, day care and recycling.



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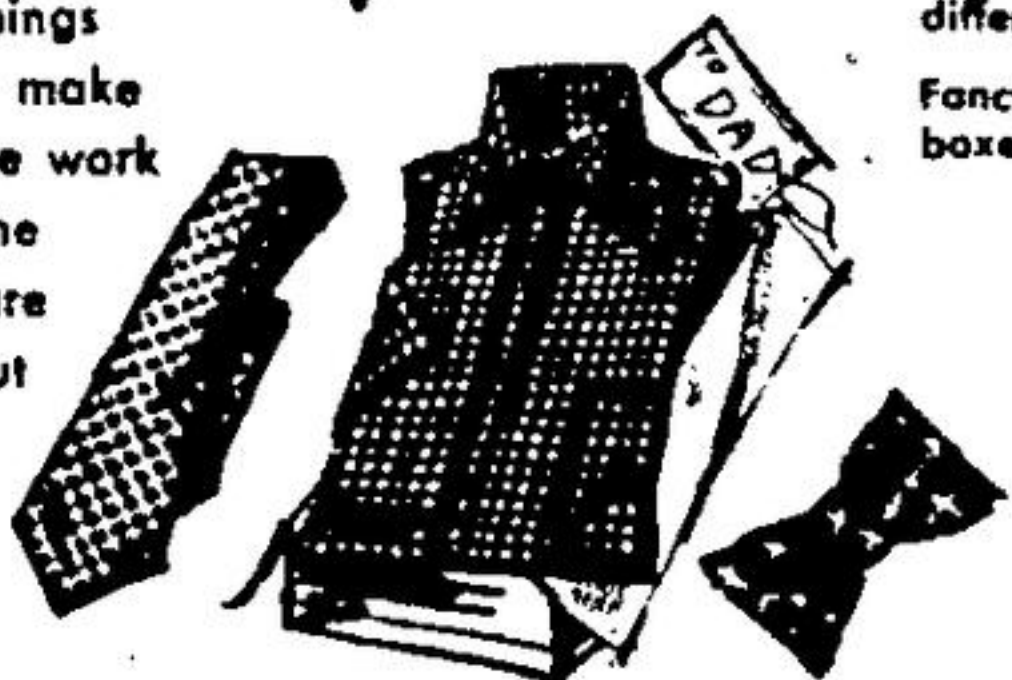
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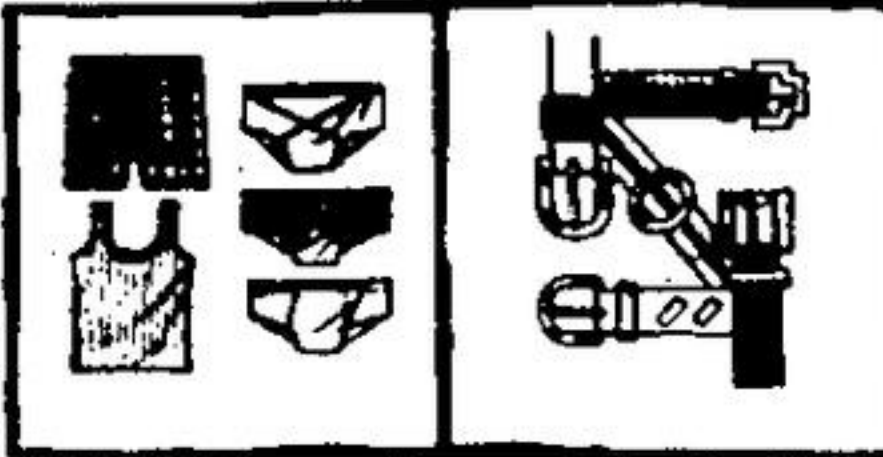
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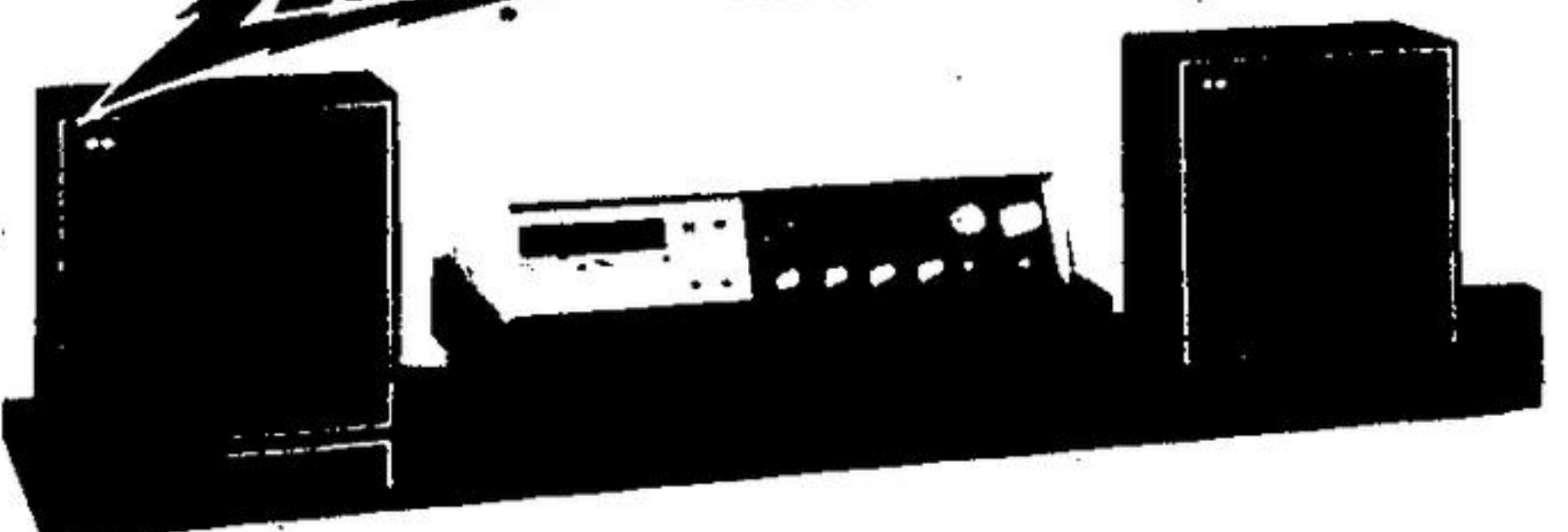
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
