Pearl Boyd was mink rancher

Elizabeth Pearl Boyd of 908 Hartland Drive, Mississauga, died suddenly at her home on Friday, May 25. She had been in failing health for two years.

Pearl Wallace Boyd spent much of her early life in Acton attending public and high school here. She lived with her parents Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wallace on the farm on Main St. S. which was formerly the old Presbyterian manse.

On graduating from business college in Guelph she worked for a while in the office at Beardmore and then later went to work for Hartley Harrison at Acton

Machine Company which later moved to Toronto. She worked as office manager and book-keeper for this firm and other automotive companies until 1950 when she returned to Acton to live with her mother.

Pearl and her husband Fred Boyd started ranching mink at the home place, later moving to Ballinacod, Copetown and Clarkson.

Until the last two years she took a very active part in mink association affairs such as field days and shows and was well-known throughout the industry. She was a member of the

I.O.D.E. Mrs. Boyd was born in 1903 in Nassagaweya, daughter of Robert and Matilda Wallace, and was married at Milton in 1953. Mr. Boyd survives her. A brother Thomas is predeceased.

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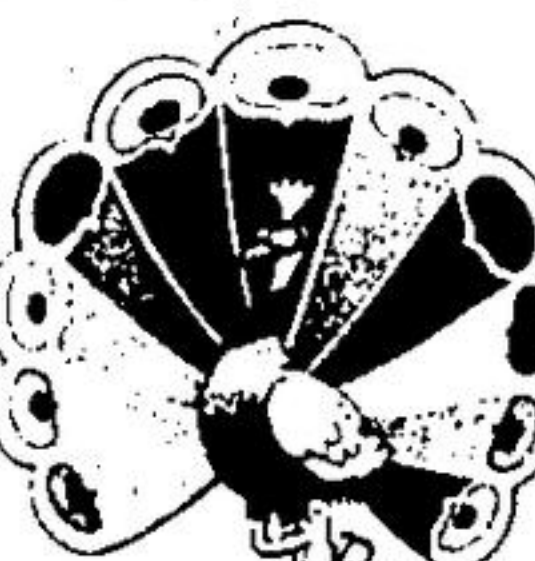
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
