See increasing demand for budget killing hydro

Demand is growing for budget killing hydro commissioners learned at their regular meeting last Thursday evening. Several inquiries have been received at the hydro office from Kingham Hills Estates, secretary-treasurer Mrs. Audrey Urquhart told commissioners.
Budget billing provides equal hydro bills monthly throughout the year with the 12th billing correcting the estimates.
Commissioner Bob MacArthur said he inquired at the recent A.M.E.U. convention how it is handled in other centres. The householder must have lived in the house a year before the rate can be established, although it is possible to have a service manager work out a rate.
The 12th payment should fall due in the summer, Mr. MacArthur explained.
Georgetown and Milton have had budget billing for about a year.

Will wait
Commissioner Ted Tyler Sr. commented he couldn't have imagined such a thing when he started on the hydro commission. It amounts to us being in the finance business! He agreed it would benefit people who are buying new homes here now.
Commissioner agreed they couldn't do much until residents have been here a year. The mayor pointed out how much billing can vary among next door neighbors. Usually billing is less this time of year—unless there's a cooling system, added Mr. Tyler.
Kingham Hills
Approval was given to signing of the agreement for phase 2 of Kingham Hills Estates with Alteo Construction. Mrs. Urquhart pointed out it is very much the same as phase 1.
Copies of the agreement for phase 3 were received from the lawyer to be circulated. It contains 161 lots with 191 units. This phase will not be all electric. Estimated cost is \$621 a lot for lights and underground services—higher than previously.
"We try not to be inflationary," the mayor remarked. He says council too tries to keep costs as reasonable as possible.
Rebate
Alteo Construction is to be rebated \$754.37 over estimated payment for phase 1.
First payment of \$6,170 has been made for phase 2.
These houses filled a need, the mayor remarked. Mr. MacArthur said about one-third have been sold to local people.
The next phase will be dearer, the mayor explained. "But our

requirement for low cost housing got them in the door."
A Willow St. man had inquired about his high bill but a test meter showed the same reading. A letter of explanation will be sent. It is possible his reading and a subsequent hydro estimate were out.
Council requested a figure from hydro on moving hydro poles on Acton Blvd. to the west side of the street. The mayor said this will make that section of the street conform with the residential street beyond, in Bovis subdivision.
Had for buses
Mr. Tyler complained of parking and turning problems on Acton Blvd. for school buses. Mayor Dudy referred to the upcoming impartial parking study to be done for the town. Actually we're in excess of other towns in available parking space, he said. He foresees better parking on Acton Blvd.
Mr. MacArthur will make contacts to see about a display for the fair, and get prices on

possible advertising give-aways. Last year the expected display was a no-show.
Personally, said chairman Wif McEachern, I'd rather give these things away to our own customers when they come in to pay their bill.
Will pay
Mrs. Urquhart relayed from a letter that the Social and Family Services of the county will make deposits by cheque when recipients of welfare are unable to pay accounts. They should be informed when cases of overdue accounts are on welfare.
"It's an admirable stand they take," said Mayor Les Dudy, but the guarantees must be there that they'll be responsible for the service.
Mr. Tyler admitted in the odd case there is trouble, with power cut off.
Superintendent Doug Mason missed the meeting due to illness but all other commission members and Mrs. Urquhart were present with Mr. McEachern presiding.
