## Meeting in Acton consider routes Hydro corridor

A public meeting to be held in Acton on Friday, July 6, at Acton high school is one of a series which will consider alternative routes for the new high-voltage transmission line running from Middleport to Pickering around the north of Toronto.

The meetings are being held before any decision on a route is made, in order that the public may help choose the best alignment.

"Public participation" is an integral part of the environmental study being conducted by consultant Bruce Howlett to find the most acceptable route for the line. At each stage in the study, citizens have helped to provide information on environmental factors and to define priorities in route selection. Now they are being asked to express their preferences among the alternative routes which appear to satisfy the environmental criteria.

Mr. Howlett's study has gathered environmental information about the entire region through which the line might run. Data was collected on land use, natural resources, park and recreation areas, sensitive ecological features, and many other factors which might influence the choice of route.

All this data has now been analyzed and a set of alternative minimum impact routes has been selected. The task now will be to

make a final choice among these alternatives. The public, municipalities and provincial agencies are all being asked to indicate the alternative they prefer.

If people cannot get to the meetings, information will be available in municipal offices from June 27 on.

## Planners oppose two applications

Members of Acton Planning Board passed two resolutions aimed at preventing building on two separate applications to come before the committee of adjustment.

The first objected to an application for a minor variance that would allow building a residence beside the former Highway Garage property because no provision was made in the application for the commercial property abutting it.

The second objected to an application by Ed McMullen to separate property adjacent to Bower Avenue and turn it into 10 single family dwelling lots. The Board felt there was insufficient information in the application about the area as a greenbelt and conservation restrictions.

Mayor Les Doby noted that the Central Mortgage and Housing would not approve the property for senior citizens' housing so it was difficult to designate it for residential development. CMHC said the property was too low, near a flood plain and too close to the railway embankment.

Mr. McMullen proposes to tear down the residence formerly owned by Mrs. Hazel Orr to give access to the property which was

## No objection to Bower Ave. construction

Considering applications for building permits in a regular meeting Tuesday night, Acton Council made no objections to plans by Ed McMullen regarding the subdividing of property along Bower Ave. into ten building lots.

Plans call for the destruction of the Bower Ave. house facing Fredrick St. as an access route to land behind the Bower Ave. homes.

Council made no objection to plans by B. LeRoy to change the frontage of lots along Poplar Ave. for the construction of a semi-detached home.

Cobblehill Developments, owned by Alf Berry, was given permission to proceed with plans for construction on 12 building lots on Churchill Rd. N. pending the approval of the town planner and engineer.

Council rejected a request from Elite Lathing Ltd. regarding a change in the boundaries of the lots including the former Highway Garage and the house adjoining the property. Elite Lathing planned to sever 23 feet from the lot the house sits on and attach to the vacant lot between the house and garage.

Permission was not given because there were no plans for the former Highway Garage building mentioned to council.

The applications come before the Committee of Adjustment this week.
