Acton minor lacrosse teams walloped Guelph and Kitchener teams last Wednesday night but the Rotary Novices were edged 7-6 by an improved Guelph squad.

In two other games, the undefeated Indusmin Pee Wee squad whitewashed their Guelph counterparts 17-0, while the Rotary Bantams shellacked Kitchener 11-3.

The executive was also instructed to act on the following recommendations: (1) Investigate and take the steps necessary to set up one or two temporary courts on the high school parking lot and levy the fee required.

(2) Request the parks board and recreation committee to ask Acton council to investigate the possibility of paving, fencing and lighting two or three courts at the high school, the cost to be paid out of membership fees of the club. It was also requested that parks board make a formal application to the county board of education for use of a site at the high school grounds.

The committee is also to look into the possibility of securing courts for social nights and other occasions until the club has its own facilities.

Delay by-law banning hunting, snowmobiling

Snowmobile and hunting enthusiasts will have an opportunity to present their case before Halton County's administration committee with regard to the county's expressed intention to ban hunting and snowmobiling from the county forests.

At the last meeting of the administration committee the committee members told representatives of the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources they wished to ban both activities.

The Ministry's lands and forest branch currently manages the county forest tracts. There are about 1,300 acres in question.

No hunting
At the committee meeting members agreed to ban the activities even though the ministry representatives indicated both activities could be carried on without detriment to the forest or other activities they might want to carry on.

Georgetown Reeve Rick Morrow told county council he

had been contacted by some people who wished to make a presentation. He indicated that he felt his mind was made up but the legislation shouldn't be processed until the enthusiasts had an opportunity to make representation.
