Tiny insects killing cedars in Rockwood - Acton area

Professor Taylor of the University of Guelph said in an interview that the cedars of this and surrounding areas are infested with an insect known as the Cedar Leaf Mite.
If the insect goes unchecked, more than 1,000 acres of cedars could possibly be killed.
Last October there was a heavy fall of foliage from the cedars, particularly in the Rockwood-Acton-Guelph area. At the time this accounted for the brown appearance of the trees, but this spring, when very little new foliage appeared, further inquiries were made. Damage was found in many of the trees and in laboratory tests a microscopic mite was discovered inside the leaves.
The mite is the second stage of development of a small moth. It

attacks the foliage by tunnelling inside the leaves, eventually killing them before it emerges as a moth in late June and July.
There are two methods of control which have been recommended. Easiest and perhaps the most effective, recommended by the Ministry of Natural Resources, is the use of Cygon which is painted or sprayed onto the trunk or branches. It is absorbed by the tree and carried to the infested parts, killing the mite.
Another method, used by the University of Guelph, is the application of Malathion 50 per cent which must be sprayed over the entire tree. Malathion is an insecticide which kills on contact. It can be toxic, not only to the user but to domestic animals and wildlife.

Recreation parks abound in area

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority operates conservation areas for the public including Terra Cotta and Belfountain.
The Grand River Authority's prize park is the one at Rockwood while the Halton Region Conservation Authority operates the well known Kelso Conservation park near Milton.
Belfountain offers lifeguards at the Credit River swimming area

and brown and speckled trout are numerous.
Terra Cotta Conservation Area near here and Monora Conservation Area just north of Orangeville on Highway 10 have facilities for camping, swimming, fishing and picnics. A modern washroom is available in the picnic area at Terra Cotta and one is being constructed at Monora. Lifeguards are on duty during regular hours at both conservation areas. The Bruce Trail winds through the Terra Cotta Area and passes near Belfountain.
Entrance fee to all Conservation Areas is \$1.50 per car. Camping costs \$2.50 per unit per night. Walk-in fee at all areas is 25c and season's passes cost \$15.00.
