Future Hydro plans also include a feeder from the Bruce line to Kitchener. Howitt felt this was another strong argument for locating the line from Bruce into the Guelph area. He noted that the modified 'Q' had been officially recognized at subsequent public meetings and was being considered in other areas, which he felt was a mark for the BHI study.

Howitt told council he had never really grasped the full significance of the maze of hydro corridors and substations until he studied the matter thoroughly. He said it would have a "tremendous" impact on the areas it follows.

Deputy Reeve Len Coxe warned also that alternatives which were not selected in the first corridor could later be used for intersecting lines so great care must be taken in their selec-


