

200 children attend playground

Acton summer playground opened its doors to 200 children between the ages of five and 13 on July 2.

The day camp operates weekdays between one and four P.M. at Prospect Park until August 20.

This year's playground is being organized by a contingent of three counsellors—Rick Roher, Sue Mills and Karen Hillman. They are responsible for the direction of activities at the playground as well as acting as counsellors. They receive \$43 a week.

Other counsellors, receiving \$33 a week, are Winnie Knox, Kathy Turkoz, Ron Moore, Triska Vyzembek, Cathy Prasad, Chloee DeBruin, Gary Campbell, Valerie McGuinn, Pat

Jordan, Jill Parry and Pat Marchment. There is also an unnamed replacement for Maureen Gerth who has been put in charge of swimming pool activities. Leaders are between 14 and 18 years of age and were selected from 33 applicants by Parks Board.

Many trips Activities this year have included a trip to Lion Safari in Rockton for the five to seven year olds, a trip to Marineland at Niagara Falls for the eight to 13 year olds, a bay ride, treasure hunt and fishing expedition at the Hillman family's Pine Creek Farm in Keswick, a trip to Centre Island in Toronto and the celebration of Australian Christmas.

In the planning stages are trips to Riverdale Zoo for the younger playgrounders and to Wasaga Beach Zoological Gardens for the older ones. Also being planned is a dinosaur egg hunt and scavenger hunt, a penny carnival, Buck Finn day and a final night party.

There will also be a sleep out for the eight to 13 year olds and wiener roast for the seven and under.

Days when there are no special activities planned will be spent hiking, picnicking, playing games, doing arts and crafts and swimming.

Lots of activity has kept the park and area buzzing and so far there have been few rainy days to spoil the program.

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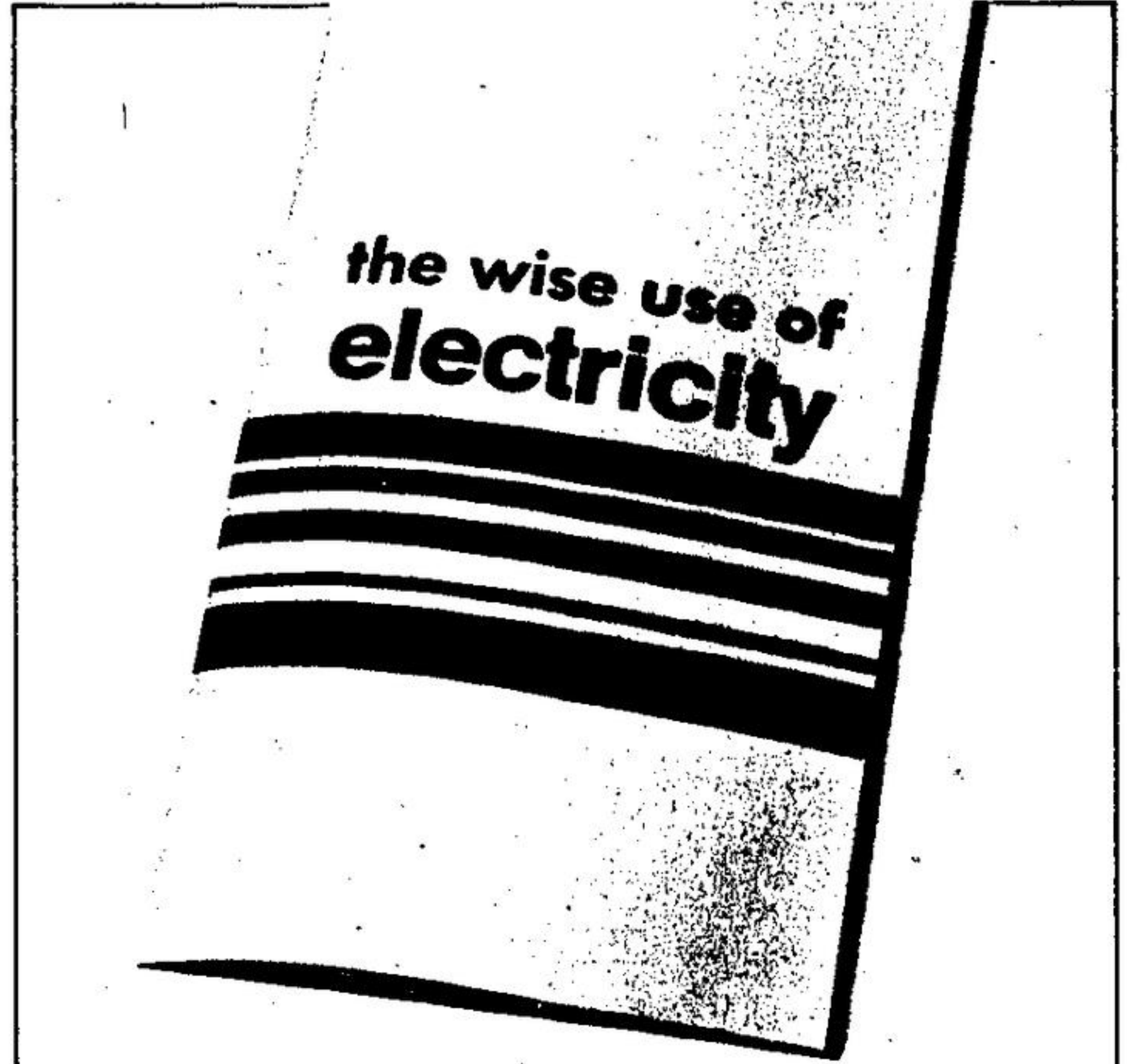
