Building inspector Tom McLean's report showed 36 building permits worth \$636,536 were issued during the month of June in Esqueving township.

Most of the permits were for homes and garages but some were for fences around swimming pools, garages and renovations. Largest permit was for a

restaurant and four bedroom apartment at Lot 5, Concession 2, worth \$72,326.

Reeve Tom Hill and council who had once before been warned by the province about exploding development, expressed some concern about June's figures, but were assured by Mr. McLean that all development was legal.

Let's talk about HORSES

with Jennifer Barr



Question: I am a woman of 54 and wish to learn to ride. I have never even been on a horse before but would like to ride with my daughter and son-in-law. I don't wish to get into anything too ambitious, just a little pleasure and trail riding, and will be buying myself a horse. If all goes well, do you think I am too old to learn? If not, what is the best way to go about it.

Answer: Of course you can learn to ride, no one is ever too old to learn. Just be sensible and take it slowly I would recommend having some lessons on a safe horse first. You did not say whether you would ride English or Western. It doesn't make much difference, but you'd probably be more comfortable riding Western.

I knew a man who learned to ride at the age of 78 and enjoyed himself thoroughly. The part you might find a bit difficult is mounting. This is a most demanding riding activity, but if you have a mounting block (a stump or a sturdy box) this should present no problem.

When you go to buy a horse make sure you get a reliable, well-schooled fellow of a short chunky build. A Quarter horse, or that type of horse, is ideal. Go out and buy a pair of boots and a hat today and start riding. Waste no more time worrying about whether or not you are too old.

reasonably mobile object would be safer. If she got her leg caught and panicked the block would give, instead of sawing her leg in half tethered to a post. Of course, I would be watching her at all times. So much for theory!

At first all went well, except for Sahara thinking she was on a lunge line for schooling purposes and trotting in beautiful circles. She figured out how to pick her front leg over the rope and settle down to eat, so I went in and watched her from the kitchen window.

However, she suddenly got her back foot over the rope and panicked. Mac and I ran to her immediately but she was already off and running. Have you ever seen a small horse at a dead gallop with a 40 pound cement block flying behind five feet off the ground? I didn't think it was possible.

Around the house she went, missing the picture windows and the Jeep by a hair's breadth. All Mac could think about was what he would tell the insurance company if a cement block went through a window.

Over the pasture gate in a beautiful leap, cement block jumping it, too. Fortunately the block wrapped around a post breaking the line. Sahara was caught and calmed down, the damage viewed.

Lucky little girl, she had only lost a little hair and I had lost one lunge line, but it could have been nasty. I felt so dreadful as the little mare tucked her head under my arm and sobbed out her fear. "Oh Mom, it was terrible!" I guess a cement block was not a good tethering post. Please learn from my experience and use a proper tethering pole. I would appreciate letters from people with ideas on how to tether a horse safely.

grant to aid recipients

A federal welfare grant of \$120,000 will assist a Guelph project called "Toward the Humanizing Community".

Granted to the Human Service Community, Inc., the funds will assist, for the current fiscal year, a three-year project to evaluate and demonstrate an incentive for welfare recipients to help each other break through their dependency into newer career opportunities.

The project will utilize training and practical experience in developing the resources needed for such mutual help, and will seek the involvement of volunteer and professional service workers.

An additional \$20,000 will be provided to the project by the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services.
